INTERESTING ADDRESS—Hudson Bay, from the time of its discovery by Henry Hudson, through the period of the formation and development of the Hudson Bay Company, the acquisition by the Dominion of Canada of Prince Rupert's Land, the formation of the North-West Territories and the establishment of new provinces in the West, was the subject of an interesting address at Rotary Club yesterday afternoon by Mr. A. A. McLean, K. C., formerly controller of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ottawa.

The speaker gave many interesting facts in connection with the Hudson Bay Company, which still owns 2,500,000 acres of farming land in the West and employs 40,000 men and women. The policing of the Arctic Region by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police was also described in a graphic manner. Mr. McLean aroused applause when he spoke of the great possibilities of Canada, its wonderful development in the West, its mineral resources, etc. The day is approaching, he said, when the exodus to the south will be a thing of the past. BILLIARDS

The exhibition given by Mr. Quinn, professional champion of Canada, at the Charlottetown Bowling Alleys last evening, was to the spectators a startling exposition of the possibilities of the game, hitherto regarded by most as an engrossing but simple recreation. Mr. Quinn played three volunteers a string of 600 points, and followed with a short lecture interspersed with standard and trick shots which will have the cue experts of this city attempting the improbable for a long time. His mastery of the cue and simplicity of instruction are remarkable. Mr. Quinn will stay over today and will give group instruction to all applicants this afternoon from 3 to 7 o'clock, and a second exhibition at 7 in the evening.

ACROSS A CONTINENT
