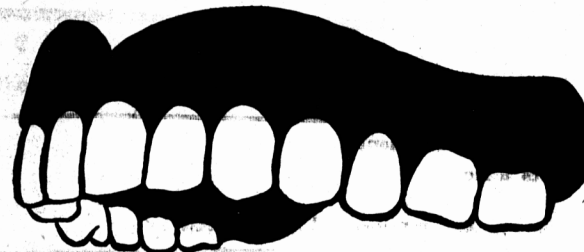

THE CORONATION OF KING HAakon

CHRISTIANIA, June 9.—The program of coronations attending the coronation of King Haakon VIII. and Queen Maud have been completed. The royal couple will arrive at Trondheim on the evening of June 12th, and wait there the morning of the coronation and the evening of the coronation will take place at 11 o'clock on the morning of June 22nd, at the cathedral, and will be followed by a state dinner, which will be attended by 300 guests. The rest of the week will be taken up with celebrations including musical festival, popular entertainments and processions in which children will predominate. June 26th King Haakon will receive deputations and give a soiree at the palace.

SUICIDED ON DAY TO BE MARRIED

QUEBEC, Ont., June 9.—The lifeless body of William Walker, who was to have been married to Mary Smith on Wednesday last, but who disappeared shortly before the hour set for the ceremony, was found floating in the river Speed, near Gold's mill today. He had committed suicide. The deed is attributed to the fact that he had been laboring under mental depression for some time past, and the excitement attending upon the wedding no doubt intensified his weakness. Three years ago he was to have been married, but he failed to appear for the ceremony, returning a few days later in a state of mental collapse.

VETERANS BACK TO THE PARADE

LONDON, June 9.—It has long been the ardent wish of the surviving warriors who fought through the Crimea and Indian Mutiny campaigns to be once more paraded before their Sovereign. Their desire is shortly to be gratified. It was suggested to his Majesty that his visit to the Royal Agricultural Society's Show at Derby on June 28 would provide an opportunity, and he has written that he will gladly inspect the men then. Only those veterans now residing in Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire, however, are to take part in the inspection. Altogether there are 104 survivors, in the two counties, eighty-eight of whom live at Nottingham. One woman is to take part in the inspection—Mrs. Milne, the widow of a troop sergeant of the 8th Hussars. Mrs. Milne is the sole surviving woman in the Midlands who passed through the Crimean Campaign. The oldest of the veterans who will parade before the King is Private William Dodd, of Nottingham, aged eighty-six, the youngest is seventy. Two of them—Sergeant Major Morley, 17th Lancers, and Trooper Holland, 11th Hussars—look part in the charge of the Light Brigade at Balaklava.
