The latest news, first of all.

The Northumberland arrived at this port at eight p. m. last evening. She carried fifteen passengers, four cars freight and two horses.

The Northumberland took eleven passengers, two cars way freight and two horses from this port to the mainland yesterday morning.

Mr. Carver was temporarily attended to and brought to Charlottetown where the Ambulance met the boat and took him to the Charlottetown Hospital. The fire was only a small blaze and no damage was done.

McQuarrie, Chapaud, whose funeral took place recently, has been absent from this province for a great many years and while in the city yesterday he called on a number of old acquaintances who were pleased to greet him again. He also visited the Hospital for the Insane at Falconwood, where he was an attendant years ago, and there met a number of his former fellow workmen and acquaintances. He noted the many changes in that institution in recent years, was greatly pleased with the present-day appearance of this city and commented favorably on the miles of concrete sidewalk laid and the improved condition of the streets.
