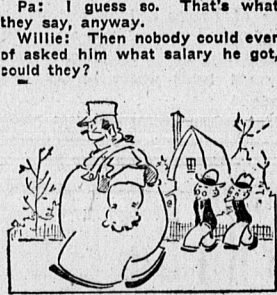

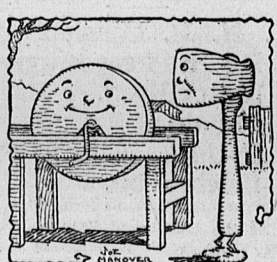

## Men Marooned

### THE STORY

Garth Guthrie sat in his trade-room with old Saul and Etienne in council of war. 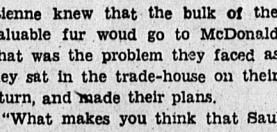

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Feb. 27.—Next week, perhaps on Monday, Premier Ferguson is expected to introduce in the Legislature, his long-awaited old age pensions bill. The Prime Minister had stated previously that this measure would not be brought down until the Budget debate was under way. Yesterday it was learned authoritatively that the bill would be presented next week.

The provisions of the bill remain a secret, but the Premier has intimated that the municipalities will pay 25 percent of its cost. Inclusion of such a clause will provoke a lengthy debate on the bill, it is anticipated, for, although the two opposition parties
