# The Story of a Heroic Deed

Captain Sterling Was of Hero's Stuff— Europe Ringing With His Praises— Forty Sailors Perished In Mediterranean

LONDON, February 25.—The news papers here and on the Continent are ringing with praise for the heroism of Captain Sterling, of Dieadracht, to whose initiative and courage it was entirely due that the last three survivors of the steamer Berlin, which was wrecked off the Hook of Holland, were rescued.

All the survivors of the Berlin are progressing favorably. They tell of exciting stories of their terrible experiences aboard the wreck, which, according to the salvagers, presented an awful spectacle of destruction. Sad scenes were witnessed at Harwick, upon the arrival for burial of the first consignment of bodies of those who met death in the disaster. Many bodies are still missing, and a number of those that have been found have not yet been identified.

Memorial services for the dead were held at the Hague and in London yesterday. Of the three women who were left until the last, two remained rather than abandon the third, Mrs. Wenneberg, who was distraught from having seen her husband swept to death before her eyes and having her baby die in her arms, and who was also physically disabled by a dislocated arm. She begged, Miss Thiele and her 16-year-old maid, Anna Rippler, not to leave, so Miss Thiele and the girl remained to give what comfort they could to their friend and mistress.

## WOMAN'S FINE COURAGE

The maid-servant showed her fine courage. "Take the other two first, I am better off than they are, and I do not mind if I am not saved if they are," said the girl, who alone of the three women was able to speak sensibly to the brave Dutchman Sperlin, when he rescued them. All three, however, were saved. Their lips were cut and bleeding, their faces frostbitten and bruised, and their clothes almost torn from their bodies. They seemed but little life in them. From the words of other survivors who are now able to give some account of what they saw and felt, it is possible to picture in a way the horrors of those awful hours. They described how men and women were dashed up and down on the deck like pieces of cork. Some were caught in the tackle and hammered to a pulp. The women, some of whom were subsequently saved, were being knocked all over the deck by the big seas, sometimes being carried forward, and again pitched with a thud against the woodwork. Within a few minutes several were stripped of their clothes, and their naked forms were lashed by the waves.

## HARRIMAN IS NOT SPECULATOR

New York, February 25.—The investigation of the financial operations of the Harriman group through the Union Pacific Railway, undertaken by the Interstate Commerce Commission in behalf of the United States Government was resumed at the Federal building this morning. E. H. Harriman, president of the Union Pacific, was the first witness and under examination by Frank Kellogg, began an explanation of the financial operations of his company, commencing with the issue of \$100,000,000 convertible bonds in 1901 for the purchase of stock in the Southern and Northern Pacifics.

## MINISTER ON THE RIGHT TRACK

Pastor of Church in Leavenworth Wants Publicity for Religion

TOPEKA, Feb. 23.—Will it become necessary for the churches to adopt newspaper advertising as a feature in attracting congregations and developing them as religious institutions? It has been said it will, and on the subject the Topeka (Kan.) Capital most interestingly says:

'Over in Leavenworth the First Presbyterian Church has a new pastor, who believes in advertising. Run the church on a business basis and you'll get results,' he says. 'I believe in advertising. I've tried all kinds, window cards, hand-bills, floggers, billboards, but the best way to get to the people every time is through the daily papers. More people read a newspaper ad. than any other kind. The theatre advertises its attractions, why shouldn't the church, to draw the attention of the people to the fact that the church is awake and doing business in the King's name? Advertising will draw the people, but only ability will hold them. The public soon finds out if a man "can't deliver the goods." A business man can't fool a customer twice, neither can a preacher.

'It is not at all improbable that the time will come before many years when churches will use advertising just the same as any business enterprise does. Of course, a church must have something besides business enterprise bank of it, but business methods will aid the success of a church in reaching the people. "The newspaper of late years" naturally gives considerable space to church announcements, because the people are interested in them, and most newspapers wish to help along a worthy cause wherever possible. Yet there are pastors who not only neglected to take advantage of the kindly disposition of the newspaper towards them, but who place obstacles in the way of the newspapers securing news about their churches. In the larger cities church announcements of Sunday services are paid for, and not in every town in Kansas are the notices of services printed free as they are here. "Such pastors are becoming fewer as the years go by, and the time will undoubtedly come when the churches will not only take advantage of the free notices, which newspapers give them, but when display advertisements will be used and paid for, to announce services out of the ordinary to which the church's wish to draw the people.
