A DORCHESTER despatch says that a convict named Elliott of P. E. I. whose term was about up has escaped from the penitentiary.

THE sitting of the Exchequer Court in this province has been indefinitely postponed, the cases to have come before it being in process of settlement.

HER many friends will be pleased to hear that Mrs. John McMillan, who has been ill at the City Hospital, has sufficiently recovered to return to her home in Vernon River.

A FISTIC encounter on Queen Street near Kent about midnight Saturday night attracted quite a number of people. When the officers appeared the combatants rapidly disappeared.

ON Saturday forenoon D. A. McKinnon, M. P. Hon. Geo. E. Hughes M. L. A., Nelson Rattenbury, President of the Board of Trade and Geo. E. Full, the last three of whom were a delegation from the Board of Trade waited upon Superintendent Sharp regarding the proposed sites for the new Railway Station and afterwards went over the ground. A report will be prepared by a competent engineer and submitted to the Board.

At the regular meeting of Mayflower Division, Sons of Temperance, held on Tuesday, May 10th, the following resolution was unanimously carried: Resolved that this Division does highly approve of the action of Councillors Hooper, Prowse, Paton and Rogers, who manfully supported the Prohibition Act, in refusing to grant the petition of the liquor interests of Charlottetown presented to them at the special council meeting held on Saturday, April 16.

THE tug Mulgrave with four new engines and an iron bridge all for the P. E. I. R. arrived yesterday morning at one o'clock from Picton where they had left at 5.30 on Saturday evening. The engines Nos. 1, 11, 23, and 27 are modern in every respect. They are fitted with Westinghouse brake, M. C. coupling, steam bell ringer, air whistle, numbers on the head lights and other improvements on those at present in use. They were viewed by many citizens yesterday.

REV. A. F. Browns of North River preached in the Baptist Church last evening from Jonah 3: "So Jonah arose and went unto Nineveh according to the word of the Lord." The subject was obedience, treated under the three following heads: (1) Inspired by the push of conscience; (2) Drawn forward by the attraction of love to God and man. The conclusion was that all obedience, as in the case of Jonah, is according to the word of the Lord. There was a very large congregation present. At the close of the sermon a number of candidates were baptised.

THE news of the death of Dr. Wickham, Tignish, at St. Agathe, Quebec, on Saturday will be heard with deep regret by many friends in all parts of the Province. Dr. Wickham had gone to St. Agathe sanitarium three months ago in the hope of having his health restored, but in vain, and he gradually sank till the end came on Saturday morning. He was 33 years of age, and graduated from McGill University in 1885. Since then he practised his profession at Tignish. He was married in June last to Miss Katie C., daughter of A. J. McFadyen, Esq., of that town. The Doctor was a son of William Wickham of Summerside, and also leaves a mother to mourn. Both his brothers pre-deceased him. One was the late J. J. Wickham, Superintendent of Education in St. John's, Nfld., and the other was J. P. Wickham who held the position of Principal in Queen's Square School, Charlottetown, for a number of years. The funeral will take place in Charlottetown about next Wednesday and will be conducted by the Knights of Columbus, of which deceased was a member. To the bereaved wife and parents The Guardian tenders its sincere sympathy.

THE death took place yesterday morning in this city, after a short illness of only a little over two months, of Robert Gordon McGregor, youngest son of Mrs. Alex. McG. Stewart, late of Lot 48. The deceased prior to his illness had been in the employ of A. Duchemin & Co. He was a loving and cheerful disposition which made him a favorite with all who knew him. His illness was patiently borne and he passed away peacefully in the presence of those who had watched him grow weaker and weaker, till the end came at the early age of twenty. To the bereaved mother the heartfelt sympathy of very many friends will be extended.

AN old resident and one much esteemed is removed from Mt. Herbert in the person of Mrs. Catherine Mutch, relict of the late James Mutch, whose death took place on Friday. Mrs. Mutch was a daughter of the late George Mason, Esq., of Southport, and leaves a family of five sons David, George, Solomon, Ernest and Percy, all of Lot 48, and three daughters, Mrs. Robert Coffin of this city, Mrs. J. T. Farquharson and Miss Beatrice at home. Mrs. Mutch was for many years a consistent and worthy member of the Methodist Church, an exemplary wife, a kind and dutiful mother and an amiable and true hearted friend. Her death will be learned with regret by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

SOLEMN and impressive was the funeral of the late Charles Hermans yesterday afternoon. The late Chief of the Fire Department was a man deservedly popular and respected by all his acquaintances. This popularity and esteem was shown yesterday by the immense funeral procession which followed the remains of the deceased to their last resting place, after the service at St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The pall-bearers were from the Knights of Columbus and G. M. B. A. and were as follows: K. O. C.—T. B. Riley, J. F. Gallagher and Alex. McDonald; G. M. B. A.—Eneas A. McDonald, S. F. Blanchard and J. B. McDonald. The procession was made up as follows: Police, 4th Regiment Band, Knights of Columbus, G. M. B. A., City Council and Civic officials, League of the Cross band, pall-bearers and remains on Salvage Corps wagon drawn by firemen, mourners, and citizens. The funeral sermon was preached by the Rev. Dr. Morrison from the text "For it is appointed to all men to die and after death the judgment." The discourse was replete with helpful thoughts. Death was inevitable to all, no less so the consequent judgment. For that our life should be a preparation. In well chosen terms the Doctor referred to the deceased as a citizen, as a public official and as a chorister. In the latter capacity for forty-two years his voice had been heard in the choir, his few absences unavoidable. As far as his life was evident to the public it was a model life, but rare are such characters and when found they merit this modest tribute. A half hour before his death his voice was raised in one of the chants he so loved and so oft sang. The musical portion of the service was carried out by the full choir under the direction of Choirmaster Blanchard with Miss Blanchard at the organ. After the chanting of the Libera a beautiful Ave Maria by Pergolesi was sung by Mrs. Byrne. The music of the service was by Pustett. Prof. Watts the conductor of Philharmonic of which deceased was one of the chief officers played the Dead March from Saul at the conclusion of the service.
