The marvellous outpouring of the Holy Spirit she experienced at that time was an abiding earnest of her eternal inheritance, and enabled her to live as a consistent and active member of her mother church. For some time previous to her passing away she had been suffering from a slight affliction which it was thought could be successfully dealt with by an operation. Under the best skill and attendance the operation was performed, and a speedy recovery was anticipated. But the Lord in His unerring wisdom had ordered otherwise and she soon began to pass away from earthly scenes to enter the regions of eternal glory. Her true christianity and deep religious experience was beautifully displayed, not only in her life of devotion and service but also in the last hours of her life here below. Although far removed from the scenes of her youth and conversion she carried joy, and an unending love for her Blessed Redeemer. These blessings were bestowed upon her in her beloved Church whose members now join in the sympathy that is extended to the bereaved ones.
