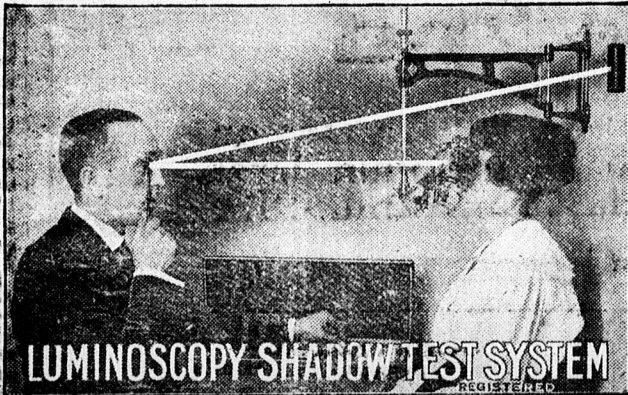

Two Children Lost Lives in Kennebecassi

SUSSEX, N.B., May 28.—A double drowning accident occurred in the river opposite the town about five o'clock Saturday evening. Lillie Dobson, aged 9 years, and her brother, Clarence, aged 11, were the victims. Silas Dobson, father of the children, and Mrs. Kincaid, his housekeeper, took the children over to the river for a little outing.

After luncheon Mr. Dobson and Mrs. Kincaid started to fish at a distance of about 100 yards apart. The children were playing along the bank between the father and housekeeper.

Mr. Dobson came upon the bank to move farther down stream and in doing so missed the children.

He saw that they were not with the housekeeper and immediately made a search. He found the hat of the little girl floating on the water and in a few minutes found the girl lying on the bottom of the river in four feet of water.

After getting the girl out he searched for the boy but all he could find was the boy's shoe which was at the bottom of the river at the spot where the girl's body was found.

As there was no eye witness of the accident the supposition is that the little girl fell in and the boy went to her assistance and both were drowned.

TWO SOLDIERS HONORED.

The spacious home of Mr. George H. Hume, Brooklyn, was the scene of a very pleasant gathering on Friday, May 22. Notwithstanding the busy season of the year, practically the whole settlement turned out to celebrate the home-coming of two more boys from "over there." Pte. Daniel H. Bears and Gunner George Compton. After a well worded address of welcome was read by the teacher, Miss MacKinnon in behalf of the people of Brooklyn, the soldier boys were each presented with a ten dollar gold coin. L. W. MacKinnon, the only soldier present of those who had returned previous to this occasion, was presented with a five-dollar gold coin. The lesser value given him was on account of the fact that he had been

the recipient of the district's generosity in this respect at his own home-coming. The boys, taken wholly by surprise, responded in great style—thanking the people for their kindness and good cheer and expressing their own gratitude to be home among them once more. After some further remarks were made by the leading speakers of the district, the ladies took charge of the proceedings, and the latest in fine culinary art was served to each and all. The remainder of the night was enjoyably spent in various forms of amusements; the excellent Victrola music furnished by Mr. Jack Matheson was greatly appreciated. The gathering dispersed with the singing of Auld Lang Syne, after which a great "bounce" and a hearty round of cheers were given to returned soldiers.

Pte. D. H. Bears is the son of Mr. Thomas Bears, of Brooklyn. He went over from St. John, with the original "Fighting 26th," in 1915; crossed to France in the fall of the same year; was wounded severely in the head in February of 1916, a bullet entering immediately below the left eye close to the nose and passing out behind the left ear. He remained in a hospital in England until August 8, 1917, when he was again sent to the lines in France, where he served until his division reached the Rhine. Gunner Geo. Compton is a native of Bangor, P. E. I., but at present residing with his father-in-law, Mr. Geo. H. Hume, Brooklyn. He left Charlottetown with the 93rd Siege Battery, took part in all the engagements that made that unit famous. He was wounded in the arm early in 1918, but "came back" again and fought until the Hun was pushed beyond the Rhine.
