USE MALARIA TO CURE.

Contrary to general popular opinion, frequent doses of quinine when you go to the seaside or any place where mosquitoes congregate will not ward off malaria. This is one of the interesting facts about malaria that have been established as a result of attempt in insane hospitals in the United Kingdom to cure of paralysis of the insane by intercurrent action of malaria.

Artificially induced malarial fever is one of the most modern methods of treating paralysis and insanity, though the curative effect of fevers on mental disorders was known to such ancient healers as Hippocrates and Galen.
