Stock Markets At A Glance

CHICAGO, Feb. 7 (CP) — Wheat and rye sagged today but short covering resulted in a rally shortly before the close. Losses were small. The remainder of the grain futures list was steady to firm.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7 (CP) — Trade was moderately active in rye futures today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, with October month under pressure throughout the session. Commission houses and American buyers offered support early in the day, but there was some profit-taking at the high points.

LONDON, Feb. 7 (Reuters) — Following a slow start stock markets today became steadier though business was again on a small scale. A desire to await further war news and the result of the big three conference again tended to slow up operations.

MONTREAL, Feb. 7 (CP) — Sectional strength displayed on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market this week spread to the whole of the pivotal groups today and all of them were marked higher in the indices. Volume was well above the average recently and individual gains ran from fractions to over 2 points.

TORONTO, Feb. 7 (CP) — The upward trend of prices was maintained in the Toronto Stock Exchange Market today on volume still above the million share level. Profit-taking in the gold group put prices down for an index of 52 but the other index groups closed higher. The Base Metal adding 941 and the Western Oils 34.
