Although only eighteen years of age when war broke out, the gallant young officer was determined to do his bit. He was precluded from enlisting at first on account of an internal trouble, which necessitated his going to hospital for some time. Immediately on his recovery to health he joined the Royal School of Infantry during the winter of 1915-1916 and was then attached as an officer to the 219th Highland Battalion at Aldershot. He went overseas with the 246th in May, 1917.

On arrival in England he took an intensive course at Bexton-on-Sea and passed brilliantly.
He was transferred to the 85th Highland Brigade and went to France in

February of this year. He had seen continuous fighting up to the time of his death.
The whole community extend their sympathy to the parents of Eric in their bereavement, and know that their sorrow will be tempered with the fact that their boy died as he lived a courageous, high-minded, clean-souled soldier and gentleman.
