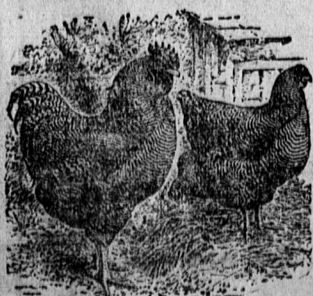

SPORTING NEWS

MCDONALD WINS

A large number of spectators gathered at the York Theatre, St. John, on the 26th, inst. to witness the wrestling match between Sam Anderson and Don McDonald. The match was a champion one, a contest for the International Championship Belt, won at Manchester, Eng., some five years ago by Anderson. The first fall was Anderson's. He obtained a scissors hold and forced McDonald to the mat in 16 minutes. After a five minute interval the men went at it again and it was now McDonald's turn to even matters. He had a toe hold on Anderson and forced his shoulders to the mat. After nine minutes more McDonald managed to get the deadly toe hold on his opponent and Anderson went down to defeat. After the match McDonald stated that as he had now won the belt he was prepared to defend it to the best of his ability. Jim McCaffrey of St. John, was referee. McDonald is a native of this province and Sam Anderson had been seen here in wrestling bouts, in which he proved himself to be a thorough mat artist.

P. E. ISLANDER'S HARD LUCK.

TWO STEAMERS STRIKE THE PIER.

HALIFAX, Dec. 28.—In attempting to reach the immigration pier, two liners collided with the new number two pier on Saturday. First delayed three hours in quarantine while the pipes of her hydraulic anchoring gear were thawing out, the Uranium later experienced difficulty in approaching the piers. CARDINAL STOU'S DANCES TO END "TROT."

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—In compliance with the wishes of Cardinal Farley, the Ladies Auxiliary of St. Vincent's hospital has been announced that it will this year abandon the usual dance at the Waldorf-Astoria for the benefit of the hospital fund and instead will make a direct appeal for money. The Cardinal's disapproval of the modern dancing is having an unexpected effect on charity entertainments.

The new order will mean a reorganization of church fairs and bazaars and will, prominent Catholics say, revolutionize the mode of contributing to the support of hospitals, schools and other institutions under the direction of the Church.

A member of the auxiliary speaking for the president said yesterday that this would be the first time in sixteen years that the annual dance had been abandoned. It is customary for those contemplating giving an entertainment for the benefit of any Catholic charity or institution to request of the Cardinal or some high dignitary of the Church permission to give.

This year the president of the auxiliary made her request as usual in person and she was told by the Cardinal that a dance was out of the question this year.

The decision was not a surprise to the president and some of the other officers of the auxiliary, but these women were uncertain how the new rule would be received by the other members. When they made known the Cardinal's wishes not one dissenting voice was heard. Every woman desired to accede to the wishes of the church representatives, not only because of the recent disapproval of the new dances expressed by the Pope and by Cardinal Farley, but because they also were not in favor of encouraging the new steps.

HOW TO MEET THE DOGFISH EVIL.

RAGGED ISLAND, Dec. 27.—One of the branches of the fishing business of which we do not read very much, which is pursued by a large portion of our fishermen, is the annual boat or day fishing. This work is pursued largely by boats of from 20 feet over all to scoops of from 6 to 10 tons, manned by from one to three men. The fishing is mostly done by trawls, the average amount of trawl per man being 40 lines of 50 balloons each or an amount which reaches over two miles. The fisherman baits and hauls his trawl several times during the day. One of the worst pests which the fishermen have to contend with is the dogfish which is unit for food purposes, although some of the friends of the fishermen would have them believe they are. Often the fisherman on going to haul his trawl, finds a dogfish on every hook and his trawl badly tangled and mixed. They also destroy thousands of food fish—such as mackerel and herring, which have been caught in nets, and ruin nets by eating large holes in them. One of the ways of overcoming these pests is by the establishment of reduction works, such as the Dominion government has established at Clark's Harbor and Canso, said reduction works to be established at the principal fishing centers such as Digby, Westport, Yarmouth, Lockeport, LaHave, etc. The two sources of revenue from dogfish is oil and fertilizer. The oil is of a very high grade and brings a good price. Thirty average dogfish will produce a gallon of oil if secured fresh, as dogfish deteriorate after being out of the water for a time. The fertilizer is reliable at the same price as chemical fertilizer and is said to be its equal as a crop producer and to excel chemical fertilizer as a land builder. The establishment of reduction works would give the fishermen a chance to make these pests a source of income and would also be a source of revenue to the Dominion government, as we believe these works can be established on a paying basis. The price usually paid per ton is \$1, and a fisherman can easily catch from two to three tons per day during the height of the dogfish season.
