Miss Mary G. McKinnon St. Peter's Bay has received the following letter from her cousin C. S. M. J. Wilson Southampton, now Somewhere in France. Somewhere in France 3-1-18 Dear Cousin Mary:—I have intended to write you for a long time but somehow I never got around to it.

Dear Cousin Mary:—I have intended to write you for a long time but somehow I never got around to it. Ever since last May I have been out of the trenches as Q. M. S. for my company. It was a fairly easy job but I did not like it very well as there was no excitement in it. I am back in the trenches once more as Company Sergeant Major so I feel right at home again and will have a chance of having a whack at Fritz again.

The St. Peter's boys have been very unlucky in this war. Poor Sylvester Lewis and Louis McEwen were the last killed. I saw Sylvester the last of Sept. The Canadians went up to Belgium shortly afterwards. His Battalion were on our left in the battle of Passchendaele but the first I know that Sylvester was killed was in a letter from home.

I saw Paddy Bassy and Stewart McEwen two weeks ago. They are coming to this battalion soon and will likely be in my company. Maynard Sanderson is battalion butcher. It is a good job and he is a good man for the job too. While I was C. Q. M. S. I was with him all the time.

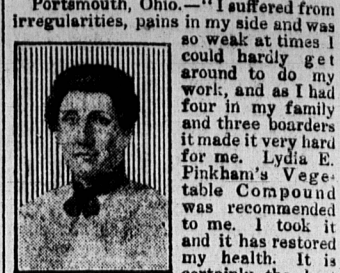
