Scottish War Bride Convicted

LINDSAY, Ont., Nov. 7.—(CP)—Jean McAllister, 26, was convicted Saturday of manslaughter in the pistol-slitting last Sept. 8 of her naval veteran husband, 29-year-old John McAllister of Hamilton. An assize court jury acquitted her of a murder charge. The jury submitted a strong recommendation of mercy. Justice R. W. Treleven agreed with the jury's verdict that McAllister offered strong provocation. He recommended her to Nov. 10 for sentencing.

Recalls Previous Visit

Five Freight Cars Are Derailed Near Freetown

A train derailed that put five freight cars loaded with potatoes off the track two miles west of Freetown, completely demolishing two of them, occurred about five o'clock Saturday afternoon and held up traffic on the line until twelve noon yesterday. No one was injured. The train, a special freight, left Summerside for Borden at 3:10 p.m. with twelve cars, mostly box cars and refrigerator cars loaded with seed potatoes for the United States. When the accident occurred, five cars, two reefers and three box-cars, left the track. Two of the cars burst open spilling their contents along the right-of-way. A third turned on its side but remained intact and the other two remained upright. The locomotive was not derailed.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—(CP)—On the quietest Remembrance Day within memory, solemn Britons assembled in flag-draped Whitehall today to observe two minutes of silence commemorating the dead of two world wars.

Juvenile Delinquency Declines In Montreal

MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—(CP)—Police came up with figures today to show that Montreal's juvenile delinquency has dropped 50 per cent in three years, and they attribute much of the drop to a campaign started nearly two years ago by Captain Detective Ovide Pelletier, head of the juvenile delinquency squad.

White House Being Closed For Repairs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—(AP)—The White House is being closed immediately to all sightseeing and social events because "extensive repairs must be made to assure the safety of the building." It was officially announced. The mansion, labelled a "firetrap," will be closed "until further notice." Meantime the President presumably will occupy Blair House, a nearby building where the State Department customarily houses distinguished guests.

N. S. Has Fourth Hunting Fatality

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N.S., Nov. 7.—(CP)—Paul Currier of Dorchester, Mass., Saturday was shot and killed by a hunting companion in woods near Milford, N.S.

Attempted Revolt Reported In Korea

SEOUL, Korea, Nov. 1.—(Monday)—(AP)—Home Minister Y. Yoon of South Korea said today he had been informed that thousands of North Koreans had been killed during the last few days in attempted revolts against the Communist regime in the Soviet occupation zone.
