Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, Sept. 5—(CP)—The trading tempo held around the recently improved level today on the Toronto exchange. Turnover of 400,000 shares was 13,000 shares under Thursday's volume.

O'Brien traded 40,000 shares and held a gain of 11 cents at 1.68. The day's high was 1.72. Realizing was in evidence in Malaric Gold Fields and it closed unchanged at 2.10 after touching 2.20 in the early session. Malaric had turnover of 43,000 shares. Gains of 3 cents or more by Preston, San Antonio, Cochenour Williams, Pickle, Crow and Hallnor. Moderate losses appeared for Annor, Conlaurem, MacLeod-Cocksiuit and Upper Canada. Smelters weakened one and other senior issues held unchanged. Steep Rock and Sherritt, weakened slightly.

Gains of a point or more were netted by Distillers-Seagrams pfd, Dominion Bank, Goodyear Tire, Page-Hersey and DeHavilland. Mining traditions were dropped by interested leaders including Dominion Bridge, Canadian Car, Industrial Alcohol A, Laura Scord and Walkers common.

Home Oil traded actively and closed 7 cents up at 2.47 while Anglo-Canadian added a cent, Calgary and Edmonton 3 cents and Highwood 4 1-2.

- NEWSY NOTES -

SEA LAVENDER

From Mrs. W. D. Ross, of Kinross, comes a note enclosed in a box of bloom. It reads:—"Dear Agricola, The enclosed plant I found growing in the sand along the shore at Earnscliffe. The tide covers it when in. "The local farmers call it shore heather. I enclose part of bloom and two leaves for identification. The leaves form a flat growth at base of the plant. The bloom varies in size; some bunches are 10 inches wide. There is a similarity to Scotch heather. Yours truly

BE CAREFUL WITH GARDEN PRODUCE

The garden patch is one of the most profitable pieces of land on the farm; it provides food that is not taxed nor exploited, and better still helps us to vitamins of all kinds. It is a thousand pities that the cities of Canada have not—to an extent—adopted the plan of "allotment gardens" as followed out in England; such gardens would prove their worth just as the farmer's garden does. In Newcastle on Tyne the city council fenced off a portion of the public land to make 120 allotments on a 21-year lease. The allotment-holders were expected to put up the interior fences and to pay for the water being "led in" from the water mains. The present writer took up one of the allotments and did very well at it; we had as many vegetables as we could eat, and nearly always had some for sale.

WHAT IS A NAME?

Asked Shakespeare, and today the answer is that the study of names is a most fascinating pursuit. In the time of the Anglo-Saxons each individual had one given name only; it might be Ceawlin, Edward, Alfred, etc., given one may suppose by the parents. But that was not enough for there might be several Alfreds in a community; hence eventually they were given nicknames by none-to-particular acquaintances. So by the time that William the Conqueror took the first English census there were names like Wulfstan, Beornstap, Edward Gotobed, or Andreas Losh, wit, besides others too numerous to mention." By Henry VIII's time people in most parts of his realm had achieved stable surnames.

AN APPRECIATION

Here is a letter from a well-known islander, Professor Gordon C. Warren, now of Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S. It reads in part: "I was recently on P. E. Island, teaching in the school at Marshfield, and Mr. Ludlow Jenkins kindly gave me a copy of 'A New Flora of Prince Edward Island.' I was delighted to receive it and wish to assure you that you have indeed given me a good gift. There is a family name in the Wheatley River district which bears out this statement: the name of Ling. Ling is the name of a village in Somerset, Eng., about 8 miles from Taunton. It is, or perhaps was, a long village; the row of houses extending a considerable distance on the 'turnpike' or road Ling, ling, or Lang, are simply variations of the Anglo-Saxon word for 'long'."

Tennyson's Worst Line

A paragraph in "Notes by the Way" gave "and that good man the clergyman, has told me words of peace," as Tennyson's worst line. The quotation is from "The May Queen," and the words are spoken by an artist, a country child who knows a little about the die. Simplicity of speech is to be expected under these circumstances and is justification enough for the line. I am an admirer of Tennyson's poetry in general, but if I were asked for his worst line I'd quote the closing stanza of "Enoch Arden." The story of the shipwrecked sailor's home-coming is most moving and has been translated into many European languages; but it comes down to earth at the end with ludicrous suddenness:

"So past the strong heroic soul
And when they buried him the
little port
Had seldom seen a costlier funeral."

ered a white violet that was regarded at the time as a new species and named by Dr. Greene "Viola Watsonii" in honor of its discoverer. But according to information supplied me by the late James Vroom, a competent botanist of St. Stephen, N. B., and a personal friend of Watson's, it proved to be only a hybrid, and not a new species. You carry the name on your list under the section bearing the caption "Species doubtful and requiring confirmation. It may now be dropped from the list of island plants.

"While dealing with the violets, I may suggest that there are some authorities who maintain that Viola blanda Willd. is not found in the Maritime Provinces and its range as given in Britton and Brown's "Illustrated Flora of the Northern States and Canada," second edition, 1915, lends support to that view. Nova Scotia and New Brunswick I find two common white violets—Viola incognita Brainerd, the Large-leaved White Violet, and Viola pallens (Banks) Brainerd, the Northern White Violet. The latter has more rounded leaves than the former, usually longer scapes, and grows in wetter situations. Of Viola pallens Britton and Brown's "Illustrated Flora" says: "Long mistaken for V. blanda Willd., and figured for that species in the first edition of this work." It is highly probable that these two species are to be found on P. E. Island.

"I was gratified to find Viola arvensis Murray, the European Field Pansy, in a field near the shore at Marshfield. It was the first time I had seen the plant.

"Pardon a stranger for insisting on you so long a letter, and accept my grateful thanks for the fine service you have done in preparing so careful a list of the plants of your beautiful Province. Sincerely yours, G. C. Warren.

I was extremely pleased to have Professor Warren's letter; first because he expresses his appreciation of the little list and of the research that has gone to the making of it; and secondly, because it contributes several items of interest to me, and doubtless to others who study Nature.

I mentioned Francis Bain and John MacSwain in the "Foreword" because (though I did not personally know either gentleman) I had a great respect for the work they did in listing the birds and plants of the Island. They were sometimes wrong in their conclusions; it is true, but mistakes in the identity of plants and birds often occur in young or partially explored countries, where the text books themselves are none too accurate.
