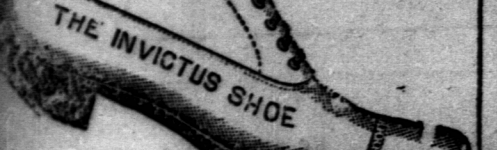
## CHILD BURNED TO DEATH.

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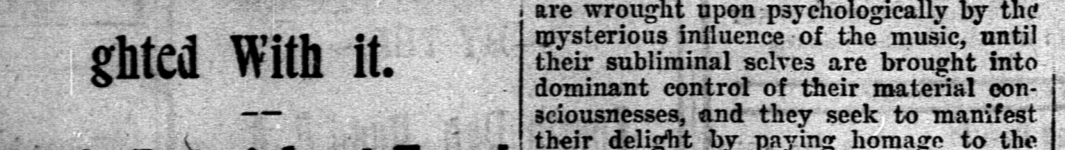
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## THE REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

### Important Matters Discussed at the Session—The Action of the School Board—Appointment of the Electric Light Inspector—Redistribution of Street Lights, etc.

There was a full attendance at the monthly meeting of the City Council last evening. Mayor Warburton presided, and after routine communications were read from the School Board regarding continuance of manual training and lay log on the table of former communication from Council, Councillors. Whear and Lyons were both opposed to further expenditure for manual training.  
A communication from C. F. Fraser acknowledging a grant for the school of the blind was read.  
The opinion of Recorder Hazard was submitted to the effect that the Island Revenue department must be applied to for an electric plant inspector. If an inspector was appointed, the Councillors thought the city instead of the company would be liable.  
W. J. O'Reilly asked to be forgiven the tax of \$25 for opening a billiard hall, without a saloon. Councillors. Whear, Lyons, Moore, Grant thought the tax too high and notice was given of an amendment to reduce it to \$10.  
In answer to W. W. Harper regarding the delay at his fire in September, the matter was referred to the Fire Board.  
A vote of thanks to COUN. PATON for the drinking fountain was unanimously passed.  
A motion that the steam roller be not lent to private parties, carried.  
Mayor Warburton read a short report of his visit with COUN. PATON and Whear to attend meeting of Municipal Union.  
COUN. WHEAR as Chairman of committee submitted a number of changes in the placing of lamps for street lighting. After discussion the report was adopted.  
COUN. WHEAR brought up matter of the new station and a resolution endorsing the Gt. George site was passed unanimously.  
Councillor Whear also introduced the matter of the dismissal of J. M. Duca. He referred to Dr. Taylor's strictures on him and thought the School Board's action was uncalled for. He was surprised that the Council's appointees should be the ones taking the initiative. He moved a
