Sons of Temperance in Charlottetown will be interested in the following from a New Brunswick exchange:—The 62nd anniversary of Golden Rule Division, No. 51, Sons of Temperance, was celebrated in a fitting manner in the division hall this evening, the members, assisted by a number of invited guests, holding a meeting that was of much interest. M. M. Tingley, the worthy patriarch, who is also the D. G. W. P. of the division, presided, and an entertaining programme was carried out. The division was organized when the late Sir Leonard, then S. L. Tingley, was grand worthy patriarch, and Wm. Campbell, grand scribe. During the long period of 62 years the division has been continuously in existence, and its creditable record, both as to longevity and in its good work among the young, is a just source of pride to its members and friends. The division was instituted on March 26, 1912. Among those in attendance was Rev. W. J. Kirby, well known in this province.

The Guardian's condensed report of the speeches in the Legislature there was an important omission from the remarks of Hon. Mr. Arsenault, in which he pointed out that in a second memorandum presented by the delegates at Ottawa on February 23—weeks before Mr. Hughes had spoken—the following representation was made:—"No 3. This subsidy for want of Public Lands is paid to four Provinces only, viz: Manitoba, P. E. Island, Alberta, Saskatchewan. All the other Provinces own their Crown Lands. P. E. Island, under the terms of Confederation, received \$45,000 and Manitoba \$45,000. In 1885, Manitoba's subsidy was increased to \$100,000. A further increase may be given Manitoba under this head by proposed extension of boundaries, Alberta and Saskatchewan, established in 1905, received compensation to each province for Public Lands, \$375,000 to increase with increasing population up to \$1,115,000. This subsidy for want of lands appears to have been framed to meet the necessities of landless provinces. It might well be increased for P. E. I., in view of its necessities, and the immensely better terms given to the newer Provinces.

REWED, LEARNS HUSBAND LIVES

NEW YORK, March 28—Like a tale from fiction is the curious matrimonial tangle in the life of Mrs. James E. Norton, wife of a prosperous business man of No. 356 Union street, Brooklyn. Mrs. Norton for sixteen years has believed herself the wife of the Brooklyn man. Recently she learned that the man whom she married at the age of fifteen and whom she believed to have been dead for many years is alive and, believing her to be dead, had remarried. The first husband to be inserted in two Montreal papers was Joseph P. Herman, wealthy bookmaker. Last evening, in the library of her home, Mrs. Norton, now a woman of forty-one, told of her elopement with young Herman, of their separation, parental displeasure, of her "discovery" that her young husband was "dead," of her second marriage, and then the discovery that Herman was alive.

"I am in such a whirl I do not know what action to take," said Mrs. Norton, her dark eyes filling with tears. "I have consulted an attorney, but I hardly remember what he told me. I do not know what attitude my husband will take when he learns of this. He thought I was free and I—I have been weak and have never told him all.

"I was fifteen years old when I took the step that I have since regretted more than anything I have ever done in my life. Joe Herman was only seventeen. He called for me one evening, took me to a minister's house outside the town and we were married. We went on a short trip, and when we came home, were separated by his father.

"I went home and so did he I have since learned that he went to San Francisco and other places out West. We came to Brooklyn and I got no answer to letters to Herman, so I concluded the marriage had been illegal or that it had been annulled.

"But I would not have married again if I had not been convinced of Mr. Herman's death. I was reading the accounts of a fire in a Broadway hotel one day when I came across the name of Joseph Herman of Buffalo as one of those who had been burned to death.

TRADEMARK MUST BE KEPT SACRED

Court upholds owners of trademark name made valuable by advertising.

The value of advertising, especially to manufacturers, was never more clearly shown than in the decision of Mr. Justice Charbonneau, in the District Court of Montreal. A few days ago, a new retail firm, with the word "Vineberg" as a part of their firm name, in inaugurating its advertising campaign, caused to be inserted in two Montreal papers large advertisements of which were the words "Progress Proclaimed." H. Vineberg & Co. Limited, proprietors of "Progress Brand Clothing" immediately made application for an injunction restraining this retail firm from using, for publicity purposes, the word "Progress."

H. Vineberg & Co., Limited claimed that the use of the word "Progress," especially in connection with the name Vineberg, was calculated to mislead the public into believing that the new arrival was somehow or other connected with the older firm of the same name. As a matter of fact such an impression was created among the customers of the petitioner, several enquiries being made asking whether the petitioner had decided to enter the retail field. As the ethics of the wholesale business precludes this possibility, except at the risk of losing all its clientele, the injury brought about by the false impression which had gained currency might have been incalculable.

H. Vineberg & Co. Limited have made a specialty of their "Progress Brand Clothing," which has been so widely advertised as to be sold to the trade in practically every town as well as city in Canada. The application for injunction was not opposed and judgment was rendered in default. His Lordship, Mr. Justice Charbonneau, making the injunction so far reaching that the respondent, as well as the newspapers figuring in the case, are forbidden to publish any advertising material for respondent in which the word "Progress" is found.

ILLICIT DEALING IN BEAVER SKINS.

NORTH BAY, March 27—An important seizure of beaver skins was made last night when fifty-six splendid pelts were found in a trunk on the Cobalt special checked from New Liskeard to Matawa. The owner is said to be a former member of the Dominion parliament who has been under surveillance for some time, of being in the illicit fur business. Arrests are expected, today.
