Britain's smashing offensive all but chased the Italians out of Egypt in the 67th week of the war and, with the Greeks continuing their advance in Albania and a political storm brewing in Italy, observers looked to British East African forces to round out Italy's discomfiture by attacking Ethiopia.

The British Army of the Nile under Gen. Sir Archibald Wavell's command recaptured Sidi Barrani in Western Egypt, took at least 20,000 prisoners, including five generals, and pushed the Italians steadily back toward Libya. The air force, under a Canadian, Air Commodore Colishaw, won control of the Egyptian skies and from the sea the Royal Navy harassed the Italian retreat along the coastal route.

An attack on Ethiopia would be a logical move to keep the ball rolling against the Italians. Information in London was that units of Italian East Africa is on the increase, with five separate rebel forces already operating in Ethiopia. In any such operation the role would be played by South African forces crossing into southern Ethiopia from Kenya, while in the north the British would strike from the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

In Albania the Greek forces laboriously continued their offensive in the direction of the port of Valona, once important as a debarcation point for Italian troops but now said to have been rendered useless by repeated air attacks by the British air force. Italian air bases in Durazzo, Albania's chief port, and at Tirana, the capital, were said to have been made untenable by R.A.F. bombers.

The Italian internal situation was marked by Fascist newspapers' threats against the activities of "defeatists" and "pessimists" and there was talk of reviving the "strong arm squads" of Mussolini's early days. Roberto Farinacci, prominent Fascist, made a virulent attack on Marshal Pietro Badoglio, resigned chief of staff, for his role in the Greek disaster, while changes in the high command were fanned by the resignation of Admiral Domenico Cavagnari as chief of naval staff.

Germany professed to be unconcerned by the predicament of her Axis partner Hitler, in a speech to German workers, made no reference to Italy. In this speech the Nazi leader took a pronounced Fascist line, declaring the war as a struggle between capitalism and labor and between the "haves" and the "have nots."

London, Birmingham and Sheffield were the chief targets of the German air force during the week while the R.A.F. concentrated on the German steel industry at Dusseldorf and on German submarine bases along the French coast. At sea two German freighters attempting to get back to Europe from Mexico met their end—one was scuttled when approached by a British warship, the other scuttled by a patrol from a Necheronian naval vessel.

The death in Washington of the British Ambassador, Lord Latham, brought sorrow throughout the British Empire and the United States. His replacement, it was generally recognized, will be difficult to express. Long in the United States were in many cases accompanied by reiterated support of increased American aid for Britain, for which Lord Latham worked so successfully during his 16 months in Washington.

During the week of Dec. 8-14, 1915, Anglo-French forces fortified Salonika to continue the resistance there against the Bulgarians who had invaded Greece in force. Meanwhile Allied troops in Serbia withdrew towards the Greek frontier. The Italians, then fighting on the side of the Allies, captured several important positions in the Trentino area.

Gen. Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien was appointed commander in chief of British forces in South Africa.

Currencies

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 —(CP)—The free pound sterling backed down from the \$4.04 level it had clung to most of the week and closed with a loss of 1-4 cent at \$1.03 3-4 against the United States dollar on the foreign exchange market today.

The Canadian dollar closed unchanged at 13 1-2 per cent. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.00-9.91 per cent discount). The Hong Kong dollar and the Swiss franc improved moderately while the Shanghai dollar and the free Argentine peso slanted slightly lower.
