### Halifax Swimmers Defeated

Four Y. M. C. A. Men Make Fine Showing Against Acadia

WOLFVILLE, April 5. — The swimmers from Acadia University marked up a total of 59 points to the 31 points of the Halifax Y. M. C. A. in the meet held in the tank of the college gymnasium here tonight. The Halifax team consisted of only four men, while Acadia used twelve. This was a considerable handicap to the visitors, and their showing in the circumstances was considered to be very strong.

Burhill and Marshall, of Halifax, and Williams, of Acadia, were the highest individual scorers, 43 1/2 and 40 points, respectively. The 100 yard free style swim was the most closely contested event of the evening, with Burhill and Marshall of Halifax, tying for first place with Hand, of Acadia, right behind them.

Dougan, Messrs George Calbeck, Brad McArthur and several others from the west have also forwarded entries. Mr. Pendergast is trying hard to make this colt race a success, and it is hoped that Charlotte-town track authorities will see their way clear to put on a three-year-old Stake at the Exhibition next fall.

The Charlottetown colts are being jogged daily. Ernie Murphy is seen on the streets with Devilset and Glow; Peter McKenna is busy jogging a stable of four colts including Worthyset, winner of a race on the speedway last winter.

James Arbing is giving very careful preparation with Mariette the handsome daughter of Mary Pickford. Although this filly is only two years old, "Jiggy" thinks sufficiently of her to put her against the three-year-olds at New Annan.

Willard Kelly is daily jogging his three-year-old stallion. This colt is showing well on the trot, and Kelly says that the colt that beats him at New Annan will have to take a mark of 2.25 or better; the odds on favorite however is Evaset, she's established by her showing on the ice last winter.

The 1926 crop of colts is commencing to arrive. Mr. Halsey Hooper is the proud owner of a Longset foal out of a British Soldier mare, who had for her dam Nellie, Canada's greatest brood mare.

Mr. John Power the genial driver of the Canadian Express Company team has been seen handling a beautiful black colt by Land Leasie out of C. C., herself a sensational colt trotter.

It is understood that Mr. Wellington McNeil has refused a four-figure offer for Dixie Marque. Mr. Well likes Dixie and the price did not prove sufficiently attractive.

A four-figure offer was also refused for the sensational Igo, owned by Mr. Willard Kelly.

The Charlottetown track is now a member of the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit. This fact will mean better racing than ever, and Charlottetown racing has always been of a high standard.


