## WHEN GIANTS MEET

The Meeting of Jake Gaudaur and William Beach

In the opinion of many a follower of rowing, the greatest race ever seen for the championship of the world was that in which William Beach, the Dapto blacksmith, defeated Gaudaur ten years before the latter went back and took the title from Beach's fellow-countryman, Jim Stanbury. Both men were rowed to a standstill, and Beach's cutter went up alongside to take him out of his shell, as he was too distressed to finish. At that moment old Tom Green, who was in charge for Beach, looked over and saw that Gaudaur was "all in," too. "For God's sake," he cried, "paddle, paddle, that's enough." So, just staggering home, Beach retained his title, but never again could he be induced to make a match with the young Canadian who had given him such a terrible battle. Back to Australia he went, and eventually Gaudaur obtained the championship from Beach's successor, Stanbury. He had beaten the Australian in a regatta at Austin, Texas, previously, but the title was not involved on that occasion, and Stanbury fought hard, as long as he could, to stave off the inevitable. He knew Gaudaur was his master, and his defeat was foreshadowed when he went to bed the night before the race. Tom Sullivan, at whose Rutland Arms Hotel he stayed, wished him good luck as he retired, and Stanbury made reply, "Tom, I'm afraid Jake'll beat me."

## NEED MORE ATHLETICS

A Cornell Professor Presents News on the Subject

Professor C. V. P. Young of Cornell University, who delivered a series of lectures on "Health and Exercise," declared that the danger of athletics was in the misuse of them. He said: "The most serious danger that threatens the track athlete is the fact that he is very apt, upon graduation, to suddenly let down in the amount of his exercise, or give it up entirely. For many years we have regarded athletics as chiefly a matter of muscular development. Our primitive logic in athletic training was that inasmuch as strength lay in every muscle, the way to grow strong was to increase the size of our muscles. There is no inherent danger to the heart in athletics. The heart tends to dilate, as a matter of economy, whenever its work is increased gradually and the heart is given opportunity to adjust itself to the changed conditions, no injurious results will follow. I believe the only serious injury or lasting harm done by participation in athletics to those whose organs are sound is in the case of young and growing boys held to the stop watch, either too frequently or when not adequately trained. The bane of athletic life in United States is that during the years of young manhood it is entered into so intensely and then abruptly discontinued in later life. It is not less athletics that we want, but more general participation, and participation continued throughout middle life and old age."

## HE WOULDN'T OWN UP

Money help is the last assistance that the person deserving it ordinarily seeks. It is the last assistance, too, that most people can give—for they have remarkably little to spare. But there are hundreds of other troubles, the outcome of failure of various kinds, in which people, from pride and shame at the confession of failure, and doubt as to the willingness of others to help them, don't make the most of others. When just a few words might save them years of misery!

To begin with, they won't own their want assistance. They are something like the man Mark Twain knew, who nearly lost his life through an unwillingness to confess he could not swim. He had read somewhere that swimming formed part of the education of every well-brought-up person, and having digested that, he came to a solemn resolution that no one should know he could not swim. Having fallen into some water, he did not call out, but wondered how he could extricate himself without betraying his neglected education. He only shouted at last when he rose for the third time. Then, before he could sink for the last time, a man plunged in and pulled him out. When he was asked why he had not shouted before he explained: "I didn't care for other folk to know I was such a darned fool as not to be able to swim," he said, "and I thought 'raps the chap on the bank was probably as big a darned fool as myself and didn't know either."

That is just it. The belief that a confession of failure makes us contemptible to other people is also accompanied by the belief that other people hide their failures, too, and may be really as defective as oneself. —Penny Magazine.

## FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE'S BIRTHDAY TODAY

England has erected, and planned several memorials in honor of Florence Nightingale, "the angel of mercy" who was born in Florence Italy, ninety-three years ago today. The city of London's memorial, which occupies a place in the lobby of the Guildhall, assumes the form of a marble statuette three feet in height. Miss Nightingale is pictured as setting out on one of her heroic errands of mercy. The "Lady of the Lamp" is shown, bareheaded and in the simple gown of the Victorian period, standing with a candle in her left hand, while with her right hand she is shielding her eyes from its light.

It was at Scutari, recently the scene of such stirring events, that Miss Nightingale had her first experience of the terrors of war. It was during the Crimean war, when the hospitals on the Bosphorus were crowded with sick and wounded, that Miss Nightingale, who had early manifested an intense devotion to the alleviation of suffering, volunteered to go out and organize a nursing force at Scutari. Lord Herbert, accepted her services, and she immediately departed with thirty-four nurses. She arrived at Constantinople on the eve of Inkermann, in time to receive the wounded into wards already crowded 2,500 patients, and a few months after her arrival in the Near East she had 10,000 sick and wounded men under her care. In 1855, while in the Crimea, she was herself prostrated, but refused to leave her post to go home, and on her recovery remained at Scutari until Turkey was evacuated by the British. After the war was over a fund of a quarter of a million dollars was raised to enable Miss Nightingale to establish an institution for the training of nurses. Full of years and honors, the "angel of mercy" died in 1910.

## MORE THAN 500 WERE KILLED

NOGALES, Ariz., May 13.—More than five hundred dead are lying on the field above Guaymas, resulting from three days' desperate fighting last week. Col. Juan Cabrera, who arrived to-day at Hermosillo from the front, reported that he had estimated the killed to exceed six hundred. A train load of oil and fire wood was rushed south with which to cremate the bodies. The official report of General Alfero Obregon, the insurgent commander, stated that the Federal killed alone numbered five hundred with 200 Huerta soldiers taken prisoners. Both sides have been executing all commissioned officers captured.

There was little fighting Sunday or yesterday. Driven to the last station north of the Gulf ports, the remnants of the Federal army of some 2500 found itself cut off from further retreat. Believing that lack of food and water soon would force a surrender, the State troops contented themselves with holding the Federals in their position, occasionally harassing the extreme lines when any attempt was made to move toward Guaymas. The 200 Federals left in Guaymas did not move from the town.

## FAMOUS EUROPEAN FAIRS.

One of the most famous of the ancient fairs of Europe is that of San Isidro, in Spain, which will be revived today. For centuries the hermitage of San Isidro, near Madrid, has been the scene of a great fair on each fifteenth of May, when the grand pilgrimage and festival of San Isidro draws thither crowds of the population. The commercial side of this, as of others European fairs, has gradually dwindled, as modern methods of exchange of commodities have made such gatherings, for purposes of trade, wholly unnecessary. Fairs were established in Flanders in the tenth century, and soon spread to other countries. Bartholomew Fair at Smithfield, in the heart of London, was found in the twelfth century, and was long a great assemblage of the business community of the kingdom, with montebanks, merry-

androws, giants, dwarfs, and other freakish amusers, as a side issue. Gradually the great annual mart lost its importance, and became a mere resort for the social refuse of London, which resulted in its entire abolition half a century ago. Greatest of the old commercial fairs of Europe is that at Nijni-Novgorod, Russia, which is still held each summer, although, it, too is probably nearing its end. In its palmy days this yearly mart attracted as high as 400,000 buyers and sellers from all over Russia and Asia, while the total value of goods brought to the fair averaged not less than fifty million dollars.

DEAL PUT THROUGH TO LOAN CHINA'S GOVERNMENT \$125,000,000

PEKING, May 14.—The first advance of \$1,200,000 was paid to-day to the Chinese government by representatives of the five power group of financiers, with whom China recently negotiated a loan of \$125,000,000.

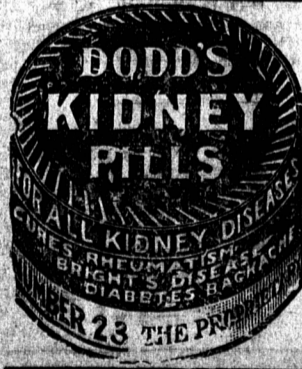
LONDON, May 14.—The Times announces that the Chinese loan will be issued in Europe next week at five per cent. The issue price will be ninety.
