MANY PROTESTING MESSAGES.—Telegraphic messages to the Prime Minister at Ottawa, protesting against the imposition of the sales stamp tax on receipts over ten dollars, sent out on the evening of the 13th inst. from the Retail Merchants Association all over Canada and others interested, ran into the thousands and included a large number from P. E. Island. Secretary B. Roy Holman of the Island branch of the Association sent requests by post card to practically every retail merchant on the Island to co-operate and received a great many replies. The Charlottetown Board of Trade and the City Council also sent messages through the local Telegraph Office on the evening of the 13th and were handled very promptly. The messages varied in length and phrasing according to the individuality of the sender, but all reiterated the undesirability of the proposed tax. One out-of-town merchant in this province wired a message of one hundred and twenty words.

ISLAND SPORTSMAN IS Warmly Welcomed On Amherst Visit

We take pleasure in publishing the following interesting article from the Amherst News and Spectator of Dec. 15th:—There are few better sports in Prince Edward Island than "Old Jim" MacEachern—the father of that popular young athlete—"Whacky" MacEachern of Charlottetown. Don't for a minute think that Mr. MacEachern is a really old man—he has the spirit of a ten year old youth—and the expression "old" is merely used to distinguish him from his son.

Mr. MacEachern who was in Amherst yesterday afternoon left on the Maritime for Sackville, where he is attending a meeting, forming the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island League, that will include teams from Charlottetown, Summerside, Sackville, Dorchester and possibly Port Elgin. Mr. MacEachern has been one of the regular Island hockey delegates for the last two years, and his interest in the game has been thorough.

Strange to relate, Mr. MacEachern maintains that the Amherst team of three and four years ago, taught the Charlottetown men how to play hockey. Back in those days Amherst and Charlottetown had many an exciting ice battle, with the best of feeling between the two teams. George Stuart, Bill Stuart, Jack Twaddle, Lester Lowther, Grimley and others gave the Island boys a number of tips—and the "Spuds" took advantage of each and every idea.

While Mr. MacEachern is a wonderful amateur supporter, he is rather opposed to the present system of sport government in the Maritimes, and is now rooting strongly in favor of Prince Edward Island having equal rights with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. He is certain that Charlottetown will again carry off the New Brunswick-P.E.I. championship this year.

OTAWA COAL FIGURES.—According to the statement issued this week by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics the total imports of anthracite coal into Canada for the first eleven months of 1922 amounted to less than half the average for the same period in the three years preceding. This year New Brunswick has received 53,329 tons of United States hard coal, Nova Scotia, 21,237 and Prince Edward Island 3,976. The average importation in the three years preceding for New Brunswick was 64,933 tons, Nova Scotia 52,425 and Prince Edward Island 6,769.

MAIL RUSH STARTED.—The Christmas rush of mail at the Post Office has started this year somewhat earlier than usual, reports Postmaster J. F. Wear. A very large amount of registered mail has passed through the Charlottetown office within the past few days and yesterday's mainland mail was particularly heavy. Indications are that the Christmas rush will be fully as heavy, if not heavier, than last year. People who have not yet attended to their Christmas mail should not wait until the last day or two and they should be particularly careful in properly addressing and stamping parcels and letters. A recent Ottawa despatch emphasizes this fact and states that because the latter part of this suggestion was not attended to last season 8,984 parcels were not delivered. These gifts were either insufficiently addressed, parcelled so that they came apart, or made up contrary to regulations. So far the local Post Office officials have had little trouble in this respect. In accordance with new arrangements, temporary postal clerks engaged during the summer have been kept on duty and it will not be necessary to engage special help for the Christmas rush. Mr. Wear stated that the last mail for the Magdalen Islands will probably leave Souris on Monday, the 18th inst, or at the latest on the 20th.

ISLAND COMPETITORS AT AMHERST—Several islanders competed in the live stock show at the Amherst Winter Fair this week and came out well in the prize list. J. M. Laird and Sons of Kelvin Grove, P. E. I., showed thirteen head of excellent type breeding Shorthorn and received several first prizes. They also did well in the general running. Mr. Peter Brodie, M. P. P., of York, P. E. Island, won the first prize for the best five hogs most suitable for export bacon also the best three as well as the prize for the championship sow, and several other awards. In the dairy test, a Holstein cow owned by Mr. Royalty was first in the aged class, and champion of the show. Her winning amounted to 150. Mr. J. H. Keirstein of Southport another Holstein breeder won first prize in the two and three year old class over all breeds. The number of cows in this test was rather below the average, some classes being only partly filled. Good records were made by Island cows. Roper Bros. of Charlottetown Royalty made a clean sweep in the Guernsey classes. Messrs Bert R. Brown of York McRae & Sons, Charlottetown Royalty and the Charlottetown Experimental farm won the heavy end of the prizes for the Ayrshires. Island cattle prize winners included the following:—Haver 6 mos. and under 1 year 1st Bert R. Brown, York; 2d Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown; 4th A. McRae & Sons, Charlottetown.
