SLAIN MAN IN RIVER.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 27—What was at first thought to have been the disappearance of a man temporarily insane turned out today to be a murder mystery when the body of Charles R. (Roy), a Pennsylvania Railroad engine driver, missing from his home there since last Tuesday, was found in the Ohio River at Freedom, Pa.

A gash in the throat and a wound on the head disproved a theory of suicide. In the cellar of the Royal home were found a razor and a broken glass jar, which, from other bits of evidence revealed, led the police to believe were the weapons used to kill the engine driver.

Royal's widow collapsed when she heard of the finding of the body. Soon afterwards she attempted to leave town. She went as far as Rochester, Pa., on a street car, but there Chief of Police L. H. White intercepted her. She is being detained as a witness for the inquest to-morrow night, a policeman having been stationed at her home.

Neighbors told the police they saw Mrs. Royal and a strange man talking in front of her house at twelve o'clock last Tuesday night. Margaret Royal, eight years old, daughter of the dead man, told a girl chum her

father had a fight in the house with a man Tuesday night and was stabbed.

The police are looking for a man known to have been friendly with the Royal family. Mrs. Royal insists she and her husband lived happily together, although they were separated for a time a year ago. She says nothing unusual happened in the household Tuesday night.

INVENTOR AND WIFE WERE BOTH SLAIN

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 27—C. H. Tolliver Airship Company, and his wife were found shot to death in their home here last night. Bert G. Lewis, who had been secretary of the airship company, was arrested on the charge of murder.

According to the police, Lewis waited for the Tollivers in their garage. When he saw them stop before their door he shot at them seventeen times. It is asserted, using two revolvers.

Both mortally wounded, Tolliver and his wife ran into the house, and Mrs. Tolliver rushed to the telephone and called the police. Lewis, the police say, shot Tolliver several months ago for \$10,000 on the charge that the inventor had alienated the affections of Mrs. Lewis. He lost the suit.

A MYSTERIOUS CURE.

PARIS, May 25—Every few years some incident occurs to remind a civilized nation of the survival of the grossest superstition in its midst. French opinion is at present shocked by a recent revelation at St. Malo, which has resulted in the arrest of a "dormeuse."

The "dormeuse" is peculiar to Brittany. She is a woman who claims a mysterious power to heal disease by certain charms and treatments permanently, by inducing artificial sleep. A St. Malo workman was suffering from meningitis, and under ordinary medical treatment, when a woman Delance, a renowned "dormeuse," was called in.

She arrived with her husband, and sent for a milk-white pigeon. While the man put the patient into a trance the woman cut the live pigeon in half and placed the warm flesh on his forehead.

This was followed by bathing the sick man's feet in some secret liquid and covering his head with a cloth that had been soaked in it. As a result of the treatment the workman died in a day. The "dormeuse" has been arrested, and a comprehensive inquiry is to be made into the superstitious practices of Brittany. It will, however, need more than an inquiry to shake the beliefs of the most superstitious and conservative corner of France.

Yesterday the Northumberland left Charlottetown at 8.20 a.m., for Pictou with passengers, mail, express and freight and arrived at 11.50 a.m. She left on return at 4.45 p.m., with passengers, mail, express and freight and arrived at 8.10 p.m. She leaves today at 8.20 a.m., for Pictou, returning at night.

A runaway team on Pownall Street, Charlottetown, caused a little excitement yesterday afternoon. The carriage was upset and some damage was done to the vehicle and the harness before the animal was recaptured. Another runaway occurred in the evening when a carriage was smashed in collision with a cart in front of the Queen Hotel. The horse ran from the Railway Station.

Yesterday the S. S. Harland left Charlottetown at 3.00 p.m., for Orwell ports and returned in the evening, carrying a large number of passengers and good general cargoes of freight each way. She leaves this afternoon at 3.00 o'clock for Victoria, remaining over night and returning tomorrow morning and leaving again that afternoon at 3.00 o'clock, returning at night.

An extension of ten days lobster fishing has been granted to the fishermen and packers for the present season, on the southwestern and western shores of Nova Scotia. This extension will enable the packers to increase their pack, and will have the effect of reducing the present high prices on canned lobsters in the European market, which high prices were very much restricting trade.

Captain Anderson of Ottawa, is now in the city in connection with the dispatch of Government vessels to Hudson Bay. The steamers Minto and Arctic will make an early start, getting away probably about the 25th of June. The schooner Chrissie G. Thomey is being made ready again. She will likely sail about June 15th.—Halifax Chronicle. Capt. Anderson is a native of Charlottetown.

Service will be held in the Presbyterian Church, Bonshaw, first Sabbath in June in the morning at eleven o'clock and in the Appin Road Church at three in the afternoon and at Hampton in the evening at seven.

The C. G. S. Brant will leave Charlottetown this morning on her western lighthouse supply trip, having provisioned and supplied with oil yesterday. She will be absent seven days and A. Lord of the Marine Department will go with the vessel.

Capt. T. G. Taylor, Agent of the Marine Department, Charlottetown, was a passenger west yesterday afternoon. Capt. Taylor is on a business trip to Alberton and Tignish in connection with the lighthouses there. He will be absent until Friday.

At the police court in Charlottetown yesterday one drunk, L. Mullins, was fined \$2 and paid up. A party for keeping a malicious and dangerous dog was ordered to destroy it. A fisherman for selling fish on the Market Square contrary to a Counties Land Co. Montreal, was fined one dollar and costs.

The Charlottetown Driving Park presents a lively appearance each evening with the different trainers working out the speedy ones. Tonight will be no exception, in fact it promises to be most interesting from seven until dark, providing the match races are pulled off, that have been spoken about.

There is no doubt that many would take a trip down the river to Charlottetown from that side but for the great inconvenience of getting to the steamer, which does not come to their side of the river. 
