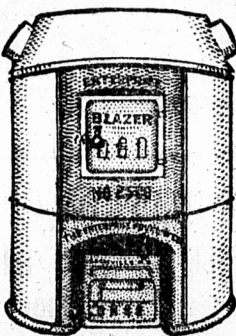

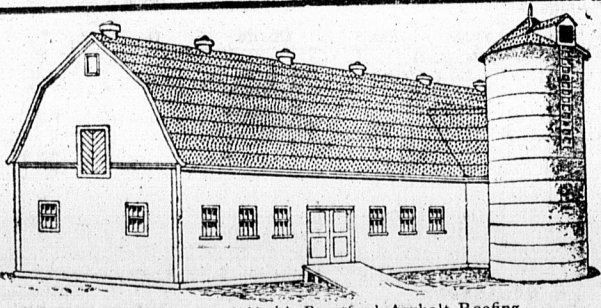

### SOLDIERS RECEPTION

One of the most enjoyable receptions that the people of Glen William and Alliston have yet given in honor of their returned soldiers, took place on May 1st, when about one hundred friends and neighbors of Pte. Joseph W. Acorn met at his home to welcome him back from Germany. A sumptuous supper was provided by the ladies and was served in their usual bountiful and skilful manner. When P. A. and Mrs. Acorn and six comrades-in-arms and their friends had taken their places at the temptingly laid table Mt. Wm. MacPherson read an address while Miss Effie May Murchison presented the hero with a gold piece. Pte. Acorn on rising to respond said that speech making was not in his line. However he expressed his thanks and his great pleasure in being back in a very pleasing manner indeed making special mention of the generosity of the ladies all over the land in furnishing so many good comfortable socks for the soldiers who never failed to appreciate them. Pte. Acorn enlisted with the 105th Batt. and upon arriving in England was immediately transferred to the C. A. I. R. D. where he served for eight months, was again transferred to the 104th Batt. and later to the 1st Canadian Machine Gun Battalion, 1st Division known as the "Old Red Patch" and crossed for service at the front March 22nd, took part in the battles of Arras, Amiens and Cambrai, was slightly wounded while crossing Canal-de-Nord but remained on duty. Stopped at Fenane for a time after the armistice was signed and then went on march to Germany, crossing the Rhine on Dec. 13th. After supper excellent music was furnished by Mr. James Thompson and Mr. John Murchison violinists, accompanied by Mrs. D. A. MacDonald with the harp. Mr. W. D. McPherson gave some stirring bagpipe selections. Needless to say the time passed very quickly, the young people at least being loath to depart even in the "wee sma hours." The singing of "Auld Lang Syne" was the signal for breaking up and after a hearty vote of thanks to the musicians and giving "Joe" a vigorous "bounce" the party dispersed with cheers loud and long for all the returned boys and many good wishes for the genial host and hostess, Pte. and Mrs. Acorn. Following is the address:—

To Pte. Joseph W. Acorn, Dear Friend: It is indeed a great pleasure to your friends and neighbors to meet here this evening to extend to you a hearty welcome home. We are both proud and thankful to have you once more going in and out among us and taking your place again in the home from which you have been so much missed. As we look around us tonight at the happy faces of your family we realize perhaps more fully than ever before that they and we also have many great reasons to be devotedly thankful to our Heavenly Father for your safe return.

We honor you as a man who has done his duty nobly and unflinchingly should be honored. We are fully confident that the energy and zeal which you always put into your work as a civilian was not lacking in the soldier as you faced the awful enemy. While we cannot too strongly emphasize the part played by our brave soldiers over there we must not underestimate the difficulties and anxieties from which many dear ones at home have suffered. Among them is your good wife who is certainly to be commended for having borne up so bravely under the strain of a double position of care during the absence of husband and father. She has played her part irreproachably and she has our highest praise. The people of Glen William and Alliston would ask you to accept this small gift as a souvenir of this happy occasion. Rest assured that it is accompanied by the very best wishes and the very kindest welcome of each and all.

Northcliffe has been satisfied, thus far, to carry on a policy of pin pricking, reserving his real attack upon Lloyd George for a more opportune moment. Grave labor disturbances in France and Italy, which appear to be far from settled, serve to check any impulse to stir up politics in the country. Attempts are made to attribute the attacks upon England by American and French to Lloyd George's actions in Paris. But the natural inclination of the British is to resent these criticisms and defend their leaders.

Lord Eustace Percy is one of the chief advocates along with Lord Robert Cecil, of the League of Nations. According to the "Morning Post," Lloyd George has quarrelled too seriously for any reconciliation with the official Liberals. "He rests mainly upon Unionist support, and finds himself out of sympathy with Unionist feeling. Says the "Post." The conservatives fear that after the peace treaty has been signed, the Premier will lean so far towards the liberals and labor, that they will be left stranded. Hence their desire to find a leader of their own political faith.

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### AUSTRALIA ADOPTS A HIGHER TARIFF.

SYDNEY, June 14.—Hon Mr. Watt in a speech at Melbourne foreshadowed a higher tariff to protect the industries which had sprung up during the war and induce the creation and encouragement of new industries. He mentioned that by the end of the year the public debt of the Commonwealth would exceed three hundred millions' sterling.

### SOUNDING TUBE TELLS OF APPROACH OF TRAINS

A tunnel of the Metropolitan Railway in London, which much of the time is filled with smoke or steam, has been equipped for its 2,200 feet of length with an iron tube for giving notice of the approach of trains. The tubes to be agitated so as to produce a noise by means of treadles, and being so arranged that it can be out of service when no men are at work in the tunnel. It was found that horns or gongs could be heard not over 700 feet in a clear atmosphere and a much shorter distance when the atmosphere was filled with smoke or steam. A galvanized iron tube, of about three-quarters inch internal diameter, is hung along the side of the tunnel at the height of a man's hand, and as trains approach or enter the tunnel this pipe is caused to vibrate in such a way that it can be heard through its length.

### DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND TO SUCCEED LLOYD GEORGE

LONDON, June 16.—Dissatisfaction with Lloyd George, which found expression in the Conservative organs and the Northcliffe press, has been followed by a boom started by The Globe for the Duke of Northumberland for Premier.

The Duke's stout stand against Robert Smillie, while a witness in the coal hearing, and his powerful attack upon the scheme for the nationalization of mines, have won him the support of the Tories who are looking for a real leader for their own party.

That the Duke's boom will go far at the present time seems most unlikely. Though there is no doubt he is rapidly becoming one of the leaders of conservative opinion, Lloyd George is undergoing severe criticism because of the dissatisfaction of the Tories with his policy at Paris but the opposition to him has been unable thus far to reach a common ground. The Duke of Northumberland succeeded to his title during the war, upon the death of his father, and became one of Great Britain's greatest landowners, possessing large coal properties. His record in the war office has been exceptional in good, and he has attained some reputation as a public speaker. His brother, Lord Eustace Percy, who was defeated recently in a bye-election, is considered a radical as compared to the Duke.

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### RECENT MUTINY IN FRENCH NAVY WAS BOLSHEVIST PLOT

PARIS, June 14.—During the debate in Chamber of Deputies on the alleged mutiny of the seamen of the French Black Sea fleet, Marcel Cochin Socialist deputy, said in discussing Russian affairs that Admiral Kolchak might be compared to forces which operated against the French revolution, and he expressed astonishment that the Allies should recognize Kolchak "just at a time when he is beaten."

Georges Laygues, minister of marine, followed Cochin with a review of incidents attending the disorders of the Black Sea fleet. He said a French squadron had been sent into the Black Sea in carrying out the armistice terms with Turkey. Referring to the trouble on the battleship Jean Bart he said that after there had been manifestations of impatience on the Bart the "effervescence" was communicated to other ships and the red flag was hoisted down. The commander of the Jean Bart, who was arrested by his men, said, according to the minister: "Boys look out you are in a state of rebellion. You will haul down the red flag or you shall strike me down at your feet."

The commander's desire was not only satisfied, said Laygues, but the sailors themselves tore up the red flag and handed him the shreds, saying: "Keep them in witness of our resolution to become orderly again."

M. Laygues attributed the mutiny to revolutionary propaganda carried on by Russians among the crews of the French fleet, to which he attributed the short rebellion.

"It was a criminal plot," he said. "The persons who brought about the collapse of Russia were to destroy France. The press of Germany and revolutionary Russia announced that crews of ships in the Baltic had mutinied. Having lost the war, Germany hoped thus to win the peace, but the plot failed; the navy remained faithful to its duty."

### BRIDGE FOREMAN KILLED BY TRAIN

CAMPBELLTON, June 15.—Alan McKenzie was instantly killed when the hand car on which he was traveling from Jacquet River was struck two miles from here by the second section of the Ocean Limited, rushing through the night to make up her schedule.

McKenzie, who has been working on this division for a year, lives in Nelsan, where he is survived by his wife. He was on his way to McLean's Sliding, where a gang, of which he was foreman, was repairing a bridge.

The body was taken by Coroner Ellis to Newcastle this morning where an inquest will be held.
