CANADIAN FAILURES

REACH LOW RECORD

TORONTO, Nov. 20.—Thirty commercial failures, the lowest number recorded for any week this year to date were reported throughout the Dominion during the week ended November 16, according to the report of R. G. Dun & Company today. This is less than one-third of the failures for the same week of 1922, when there were 94.

Eleven of this week's failures occurred in Quebec, six in Ontario, four in Nova Scotia, two each in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and New Brunswick, and one in Prince Edward Island.

MCTIGUE HARD
MAN TO FIND
WHEN WANTED

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Several process servers spent most of their time Saturday in hunting for Mike McTigue, world's light-heavy-weight champion, who has developed into one of the most elusive humans imaginable. Joe Jacobs, manager of McTigue, set the process servers upon Michael's trail, each laden with a great deal of court literature. So far as could be learned, however, the title-holder escaped every meeting of the gentlemen. At McTigue's home it was said that the boxer was visiting with his sister some place on Long Island. "Where Mike has been for the past three or four days," Doubt was expressed as to whether McTigue had been served by Jacobs' process sleuths. The positive announcement was made that no word of service had reached McTigue's home and assurance was voiced that phoning his home would be the first act of McTigue if he had been served.

Under the lash of McTigue's suit against him, Jacobs through his attorney, Louis A. Shapiro, announced that he intended to press action against the boxer in two civil suits which heretofore have been mentioned as merely contemplated. Jacobs said he will institute his threatened suit for \$50,000 for alleged slander in the Supreme Court and a suit for \$1,964.84, representing 30 per cent. of the money Jacobs alleges McTigue earned in five bouts in Europe. This latter suit, according to Attorney Shapiro, will be thrashed out in the City Court. Shapiro said he will start suit in his own behalf against McTigue for \$1,000, representing a sum which the lawyer said is due for legal services rendered in drawing up contracts and legal documents.

Removal of the Liquor Patrol

L. OF C. WHIST.—There was a good attendance at the weekly League of the Cross whist drive last night. The monthly prizes, a \$5.00 gold piece to the lady and gentleman with the highest score of the preceding four weeks, was awarded to Miss Mamie Trainor and Mr. Leo Doyle. The prize winners at last night's games were Miss Ada Smith and Mr. Vincent Couette.

ILL IN U. S.—The many friends of Mrs. V. C. Gay, Upper Prince St., will be sorry to learn that she was taken suddenly ill at Newburyport, Mass., where she has been visiting her daughters, Mrs. R. C. Reed and Mrs. Grace. Mrs. Gay underwent a somewhat serious operation on October 30 and apparently made a good recovery, doing very nicely for some days when she had a relapse and her condition was regarded as critical. Her husband was telegraphed for and arrived a little over a week ago. Mrs. Gay is slowly recovering but it will be some time before she is able to return home. Mr. Gay will await her recovery and will accompany her home as soon as she is able to travel.

REMOVAL OF THE LIQUOR PATROL.—"I could smuggle 50,000 gallons into your harbor in one month, and you could not catch me. You have not men enough to catch me. I know men who laid a week with booze under their vessels in this harbor." "There was a patrol boat appointed this year, under the command of Commander Lewin, R. N. R., for the protection of the Charlottetown harbor. Commander Lewin is an Imperial officer and when he takes an oath he will carry it out. THERE IS NO MAN WHO WILL SMUGGLE IN CHARLOTTETOWN HARBOR WHILE LEWIN IS THERE! He captured over five cargoes of liquor out of your harbor since assuming his duties."

In giving instances of the good work done by the "Moto" Dr. Genge explained that he knew every captain who comes to this harbor and that they do not keep many secrets from him. At one time there were rum cargoes to be taken off at St. Peter's Island and Governor's Island. Commander Lewin was approached and asked if he could not get his patrol boat out of the way. He said, "No! This boat will NOT get out of the way!" And those cargoes were not landed.

"A \$100,000 rum cargo off Cape Bear was lost to the smugglers last week as a result of the activities of the "Moto" which gave chase and successfully that the cargo had to be dumped overboard. The skipper had attached a rope and had hoped to regain the sunken "treasure" but was forced to cut the rope and let the liquor go.

"At the time the "Moto" caught fire and was laid up for repairs at Cardigan, an offer was made by the former owner of the "Moto" of the use of a fine speedy launch to take the "Moto's" place in Charlottetown. This offer was refused and the harbor was left unprotected.

"The "Moto" was later put on duty outside the harbor, for which she is not at all fit. She is now in the vicinity of Georgetown and Montague and FOR TWO AND A HALF MONTHS CHARLOTTETOWN IS WITHOUT PROTECTION AGAINST SMUGGLING.

"THE MOTTO IS IN THE HANDS OF ANGUS YOUNG, OF NORTH SYDNEY.

"Why should a man in North Sydney control the movements of a liquor patrol boat in this Province? Get control of your cutters right here. Then you will stop the smuggling, and that is the only way of stopping it."

"The successful patrol Prince Edward Island you must have three cutters. You must have the outside points from east to west of the North Cape patrolled and you must have a harbor cutter for Charlottetown.

"The moral effect of the presence of the "Moto" in the harbor this year was very great. It kept out a great many cargoes of liquor. But you cannot keep smuggling out of this Province with just one little boat here in Charlottetown, and you cannot expect to protect Charlottetown when that little boat is removed elsewhere at the pleasure of the powers that be. I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW JUST HOW MUCH THE BOOT-LEGGERS GOT BY LEAVING CHARLOTTETOWN OPEN FOR TWO AND A HALF MONTHS!

"The Gonths! That Customs Cruisers Margaret, Sagamore and Mr. one have been ordered to winter quarters. The little "Moto" is still kept outside and is not allowed to come back to her winter quarters. In favorable weather at the present season it takes eight hours to come to Charlottetown. Why is the boat still being kept away? Are there a few more cargoes to get in just before Christmas? Remember, its movements are governed from North Sydney, not from any body in this Province. It is up to you to see that the control of this boat shall be centered in Charlottetown."

A feature of last night's show was the illustrated lecture by Mr. V. E. Taplin, of Toronto, president of the National Tread Shoes of Canada, Ltd., and originator of the famous National Tread Taplin Shoes.

charge of that part of the Customs work in Sydney was opposed to any island control in the matter. As a result of removing the "Moto" this year there have been many rum cargoes come into Charlottetown that temperance people know nothing about.

Rev. Dr. Genge complained, on the other hand, of the repeated searching of vessels not carrying liquor, declaring this hindered the arrival of legitimate produce vessels, and that in many cases it had become "persecution," not "prosecution."

Dr. Genge stated that he was leaving the Province by the last of December. His statements created interest at yesterday's meeting and after some discussion a committee comprising Messrs. W. E. Bentley, K. C. Rev. H. D. Raymond and Mr. J. K. Ross was appointed to confer with the Prohibition Commission and later with the Provincial Government with a view to demanding proper protection against smuggling.

Mr. David Schurman moved the thanks of the Alliance to Rev. Dr. Genge for the very valuable information he had given.

It was suggested to Dr. Genge that there should be some way of finding out the party responsible for laying false information and of dealing with that party by law. "If I knew who he was I wouldn't deal with him by law," remarked Dr. Genge grimly. He believed the rumor had been started originally in Sydney.

The meeting yesterday was of a special nature for the purpose of conferring with delegates of the P. E. I. Presbytery about the prohibition situation, and was held in the Board of Trade rooms there being present a good representative attendance from various parts of the island. Mr. J. K. Ross presided over the delayed arrival of Mr. A. J. Moffatt, president of the Alliance.

A lengthy discussion on aspects of the temperance situation in this Province took place and was embodied in the resolutions published below.

Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., replying to a request by Mr. David Schurman that no report of the discussion be allowed to appear in the press, said he doubted the wisdom of muzzling reporters who had hitherto used commendable judgment and discretion, and who represented a press that had given valuable support to the work of the Alliance.

Mr. W. T. Huggan was appointed treasurer of the Alliance. He reported that about \$1,000 had been raised for campaign purposes during the taking of the recent liquor plebiscite and that there was still a balance of something over \$50.

Mr. Ross Bethune was appointed auditor of the election funds report.

The speakers taking part in the discussion of the questions brought up were Messrs. Revs. H. D. Raymond, R. C. Eaton, W. Orr Mulligan, Geo. C. Taylor, Messrs. J. K. Ross, A. J. Moffatt, William Mc

A committee was appointed to confer with the Prohibition Commission and the Government in regard to more effective judicial machinery, and chairmen for the three Counties were appointed to organize committees cooperating with the Prohibition inspectors for the better enforcement of law and order. A subcommittee of Charlottetown members was also appointed to confer from time to time.
