That was her first success. The first being the fact that she had a playground for the town's children.

At the end of the winter, the club now to the place where those who were not members were all anxious to join.

JUST FORTY YEARS AGO

Some School Statistics and Local Items of Interest.

(By W. L. Cotton.)
According to the Report of the Chief Superintendent of Public Schools, submitted to the Legislature just forty years ago, there were then in this province 419 school districts. The teachers numbered 468. Of these 41 belonged to the first class, 88 to the second class, and 399 to the third class. There were 256 men teachers and 212 women teachers. The pupils enrolled in the previous year numbered 21,269 and the daily average attendance was 11,285.

The total cost of the work done in the public schools in that year was \$741,177. Of this amount \$76,580.64 was paid as statutory allowance to teachers, and \$10,597.92 as supplements to their salaries. It will be interesting to compare these figures with the present conditions, as presented by the Superintendent of Education in his report for last year.

The evils proceeding from the liquor traffic were more apparent forty years ago than they are today; and there was more activity on the part of temperance reformers. Among the more prominent of these was the Rev. George W. Hodgson. On Easter Day, forty years ago, he organized St. Peter's Church Band of Hope, and obtained pledges of "total abstinence" from nearly every boy and girl in attendance. These pledges have been renewed by succeeding school years every year since then, and they are to be renewed again next Monday. It is to be regretted that the churches, in addition to the Catholic Church in this city, have not followed the example set in St. Peter's. There has been too much reliance upon the prohibition law, which has been continually violated, and not enough upon moral and religious suasion against the sin of drunkenness, and the waste of time, money and health involved in the purchase of strong drink for beverage purposes. No man can tell what influence St. Peter's Band of Hope and the League of the Cross have had in the promotion of sobriety and in the lessening of the evils resulting from the liquor traffic. If there had been more of such societies in this city and throughout the province prohibition would probably have been much more effective. The law though still broken by many persons, has undoubtedly exterminated the drinking customs of the province, and followed by less liquor drinking and drunkenness.

The prices obtained at Charlottetown market were: Beef (small) 6 to 12 cents per pound; beef, per quarter, 5 to 9 cents; mutton, 6 to 8 cents; lamb, 6 to 8 cents; veal, 3 to 7 cents; pork (concessed) 12 cents; oatmeal, \$3 to \$3.50; hay, 45 to 50 cents; oats, 42 to 45 cents; potatoes, 25 to 28 cents; turkeys, 18 to 18 cents; sheepskins, 80c to \$1.00.
