**GETTING READY FOR DOMINION DAY**—Mr. J. Pendergast of Kensington was in the city yesterday on business in connection with the Dominion Day celebration in Summerside which promises to be one of the biggest outdoor events of the season.

**OVERSEAS MAIL**—A full mail for the United Kingdom will be despatched by C. P. O. S. Metagama sailing from Montreal to Liverpool at 10 a. m. standard time on Thursday the 16th instant and also by the White Star Line steamer Mes-sagick sailing from Montreal to Liverpool at 10 a. m. standard time on Saturday the 18th inst.

**CHILD WELFARE**—There will be a public meeting in the interests of Child Welfare and Public Health in the Maitland Hall on Wednesday, June 8th at 8 p. m. at which Moving Pictures will be shown of medical inspection of schools and other pictures relative to Child Welfare. It is expected that Miss MacMahon will be present and will give an address. It is hoped that a very large number will be present.

**BIG SCHOONER IN PORT**—The four masted sailing vessel "Mary G. Maynard," (Capt. D. C. Torrey) arrived in port Sunday afternoon from New York with a cargo of hard coal for Messrs. Butain, Bell & Co. The vessel, which was built last year, is on its first trip to these waters. She measures 225 ft. from end to end, 36 ft. in width, and has a spread of about 2300 yards of canvas. Her crew is composed of four sailors two mates, a steward and the Captain. The 1st mate, Mr. Arthur Pye, hails from Halifax. She will remain here until next week.

**AT FALCONWOOD**—Sandy McGregor, accompanied by Professor Dixon and several other musicians were driven out to Falconwood by Dr. Frank on Saturday evening where they gave a delightful concert, which was much enjoyed by the patients and staff. They were pleased to hear from Sandy that he expects to again visit the hospital and give another high class entertainment before he leaves the Province. Through the thoughtfulness of Dr. Frank and Professor Dixon these entertainments are to become a regular monthly event, to be known as the "Sandy McGregor Concert Party."

**BAD FIRE AT GLENCOE**—A bad fire is reported from Glencoe where on June 6th the outbuildings and barn of Mr. B. McDonald were burned to the ground. The fire was a very mysterious one and supposed to be of incendiary origin. The house was barely saved by kind friends and neighbors at a great risk as the heat was intense and the source of water supply was near the burning buildings. The barn was 60x80 feet containing at the time of the fire two horses, four cows, two large hogs, fifty hens, crop and farm tools, a coach house 40x12 feet, a wood and ice house 14x12 feet with all their contents were destroyed. Mr. McDonald estimates his loss at between \$3,500 and \$4,000 less a very small insurance. The fire was scarcely extinguished before the good neighbors called a meeting in the Vernon River School and a committee appointed to solicit funds to replace the building. Already some hundreds of dollars have been collected.

**DR. YEO'S CONDITION**—Dr. Yeo spent a more comfortable day after the operation yesterday morning. He was operated on by the surgeon under a general anaesthesia and several large incisions were further opened up in the arm. Dr. Carruthers of Halifax arrived by special automobile from Borden last night and continued along bacterial lines. He will spend three or four days here in connection with this case. Dr. Carruthers last night took a ample of blood from Dr. Yeo which he forwarded by this morning's mail to Dr. Nichol of Halifax.

private departments of government of the necessary services hitherto conducted under the commission of conservation will result in a reduction of public charges which is so important at the present time.

"A further step towards the solution of the problem of the national railways has been taken in the passage of an act by virtue of which possession and control of the Grand Trunk Railway system has been acquired and provision made for reviving the arbitration proceedings to ascertain the value of the stocks. A special committee has conducted an enquiry into certain phases of the problem of the operation of these railways.

"The proposals as to revenue collected in the appropriation act will, it is confidently hoped, meet the necessities of the year with a minimum of burden on the people and on the conduct of industry.

"Gentlemen of the House: "I thank you for the liberal provision you made for the public service.

Farwell Remarks.

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: "Gentlemen of the House: "This is the last occasion I shall have the honor of addressing you as my term of office will have expired before you meet again.

"May I assure you that I shall always retain a very real affection for Canada and its people and I shall watch your progress with the greatest interest in the sure belief that an ever-increasing measure of happiness and prosperity will be the lot of the Dominion."

In the senate chamber his excellency replied to the address passed by both houses Friday and presented Saturday, as follows:

"It is no easy task to find words adequate to express my gratitude to you for the address which you have presented to me and to acknowledge the great honor conferred upon me today by the parliament of the Dominion.

"On my return to the old country it will be my privilege to submit to his majesty the expression of your loyalty and devotion to his throne and to give renewed assurance to the people of the British Isles of your well-established sympathy and good-will.

"Today Canada is formally and justly recognized as one of the nations of the world, and while she will work out her own destiny in her own way, she will, I know, ever be faithful to British institutions and proud to take her place and share her responsibility as one of the sister nations which constitute the British Empire.

"I wish to join with my personal thanks those of the Duchess and my family.

"I assure you that it is with feelings of very deep and sincere regret that we realize that the moment has arrived when we must say goodbye.

"We came among you at a critical and anxious period. The Empire was engaged in a life and death struggle, but from the moment I landed on the shores of Canada I was impressed, as I could not fail to be, by the splendid devotion and determination of her people to give their all and to make every effort till our purpose was accomplished and victory certain.

"We had the privilege of being associated with you in those dark and anxious days, and having taken part in various spheres of work necessary for the successful prosecution of the war.

"We also had the privilege of being associated with you in the hour of triumph, and since the conclusion of hostilities we have watched the transition from conditions of war to those of peace. Necessarily the progress is difficult and slow but I think that, without any undue optimism, I am justified in congratulating you on a record of substantial progress.

"While I leave Canada with deep and sincere regret, I shall take with me a firmly rooted conviction in her future greatness and prosperity. With an active population and liberally endowed with incalculable resources she will take an ever increasing part in the trade and commerce of the world and can confidently look forward to an era of still further expansion.

"I have endeavored to make myself acquainted with all parts of the Dominion and to meet as many of her citizens as possible, and I am glad to have this opportunity of expressing my very sincere and heartfelt thanks for the kindness and welcome which I have invariably received.

"The Duchess and I shall always have a warm affection for Canada and our many personal friends here, and we shall always take a most sincere interest in your progress and welfare. If at any time any of you may be visiting the Old Country we shall be forward to meet you and renewing our acquaintance."

**Halifax Stable At Fredericton**  
 FREDERICTON, June 5.—The racing stable of L. R. Acker, the Halifax Theatre man, has arrived here and his four horses, as well as two others owned by Nova Scotia horsemen that are in charge of Driver "Red" Hanflin, are now located at the Fredericton Park Association's Park, where the training camps now include about twenty horses that are being prepared for the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit's campaign.

Mr. Acker's string consists of Signature, 2:18 1/4, a pacer, and Bing Worley, 2:17 1/4; Peter Verde and Trisy Axworthy, trotters. All four have come from Mineola, L. I., the two record members of the stable last year and the others early by spring. The other members of the stable are Confession, a bay pacer, bred by the Northern Man, with a breeder's record of 2:13 obtained on the half mile track at Mineola last fall, and John D. Forbes, a handsome big trotter by J. Malcolm Forbes, the former being owned by C. H. Dewitt, of Bridgetown, N. S., who campaigned Terrace, used, 2:06 1/4, some years ago, and the latter being the property of Charles E. Smith, of Halifax who is well known in connection with harness racing in the Maritime Provinces.

**Equipping Miners With Edison Lamp**  
 GLACE BAY, June 6.—Orders were issued at the collieries of the Dominion coal company on Friday that the miners purchase the caps, belts, and special equipment for the new electric lamps which were given to the men Monday morning when they went down in the mines.

The new Edison lamps will be installed in all the collieries and are now on sale at the Dominion coal company stores. The charging apparatus for the lamps was installed some weeks ago but on account of some parts being delayed in shipment the installation of the lamps in the mines was held up temporarily.

TORONTO, June 4.—The order of the Ontario Board of License Commissioners restricting the number of prescriptions issued by a doctor to fifty orders for one quart in a month is apparently satisfactory to a very large majority of the medical profession. It was learned that the result of the questionnaires recently sent out by the Ontario Medical Association shows unmistakably that the profession is "sick and tired of being official" and will do all in their power to move the onus of contribution to the Government. At the same time there may be fireworks if an attempt is made to remove whiskey from the list of medicines.
