Louis Continues Comeback With Fifth Round K.O. Over Scrappy Al Ettore

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 22—(A.P.)—Detroit's brown bombing Joe Louis carved another notch in his knockout gun tonight by stopping young Al Ettore, Philadelphia Italian, in the fifth round of their 15-round bout in the Philadelphia Municipal Stadium.

A huge turnout, estimated at 60,000, looked on as the 22-year-old negro floored a game, but over-matched Ettore twice before polishing him off with a pair of short, paralyzing left hooks after 1:28 of the fifth.

It was in this same huge stadium, almost 10 years ago to the day, that the fighting marine, Gene Tunney, took the world's heavy-weight championship from Jack Dempsey before a record crowd of 120,000 rain-soaked spectators.

Louis won all but one round of the abbreviated contest. Ettore's aggressiveness, his willingness to mix and the fact that he made Joe miss several rights, earned the Philadelphia a draw in the third.

Scoring 203 1-4 to Ettore's 189 3-4, Louis had the Italian on the canvas once in the first, once in the fifth, when he landed with his haymaker.

On Comeback Trail

Making his second start since his smashing defeat by Max Schmeling in New York last June, Louis chalked up his second straight victory. Four weeks ago he stopped Jack Sharkey in four rounds in New York. It was the negro's 25th knockout in his 30 professional fights.

Louis had trouble getting set for his Sunday punch in the early rounds, but once he solved Ettore's swarming and somewhat puzzling attack and found the rang with his sleek guns, there never was any doubt as to the outcome.

Ettore proved as wide open for Joe's right as Louis was for

Schmeling's. Joe threw rights for two heats, then switched to his left. This weapon accounted for the last two knockdowns.

Dazed and Foggy

With Ettore dazed and foggy in the fifth from a savage barrage of rights and lefts to the head and body, Louis crowded him into the ropes and cut loose two short but vicious lefts to the head. Ettore hit the canvas for the third time.

After taking a count of nine he tried to drag himself to his feet, but he was too far gone. Just as the timekeeper tolled "10" Ettore pitched forward on the ropes and it was all over.

Not a hard hitter, Ettore is fast as lightning and a shifty boxer. He likes to crowd his opponents and get them off stride by throwing a few dozen ineffective but disconcerting punches.

For a few minutes it looked like this plan of attack would pay dividends tonight, but after Joe had thrown off the best Al had to offer he got busy on his own hook and from the third on won about as he pleased.

Except for a bruised thumb, received when throwing one of his lefts, Louis came out of the scrap unmarked. Ettore received a cut over his left eye.

Louis plans to return to Michigan for a short rest before making the next start in his comeback campaign, probably against Jorge Brescia, Argentine heavyweight, in the New York Hippodrome early in October.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 22—What they said after tonight's Joe Louis-Al Ettore heavyweight fight:

Louis "I didn't have any trouble with him. He didn't bother me much."

Ettore: "I 'Just got the works—that's all. I trained for a right hand puncher and he beat me with his left."

POINTE CLAIRE, QUE., Sept. 22 (OP)—A single Maritimer remained in the Canadian women's close golf championship hunt tonight after the first round of match play over Beaconfield's par 75, plain-like course.

While another Maritimer and a Newfoundland shotmaker met elimination, Audrey McLeod, of Saint John scored the most overwhelming victory of the day, an 8 and 7 triumph over Helen Barnard of Montreal.

Mrs. W. F. Hutchinson of St. John's, Nfld., was accounted for by Mrs. F. J. Mulqueen of Toronto, medal winner and champion of Ontario, 7 and 6. Holder of the Maritime title, Babs Creighton, of Yarmouth, N.S., carried Marie Menab of Montreal to the 17th green before admitting defeat, 2 and 1.

Miss McLeod tees off tomorrow against Ada Mackenzie, of Toronto recently dethroned open champion and a five-time holder of the close title.

Other favorites in the tourney, with the exception of Margery Kirkham of Montreal, advanced easily. Mrs. A. B. Darling of Montreal, present open queen, eliminated Rosemary Telford, another Montrealer, 7 and 5. Miss Mackenzie topped Mollie Hankin of Montreal 3 and 2 and Mrs. H. W. Soper of Montreal defeated Kaye Farrell of Vancouver 4 and 3. Miss Kirkham, suffering from a severe cold, went to the 18th green before ousting Mrs. David Wanklyn of Montreal 1 up.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22—Stanley R. "Bucky" Harris, who apparently wasn't considered good enough to manage the Boston club that Tom Yawkey's millions brought, has taken a team of bargain-counter pick-ups and made good his vow to whip the Red Sox.

By trouncing the expensive Boston team 4-0 today, Washington went 6 1-2 games ahead of Boston in the League standings, with only four contests left before the end of the season. The triumph was Washington's 12th in 20 starts against the Yawkey crew.

REMEMBER WHEN

Gene Tunney, the fighting Marine, smashed his way to the world's heavyweight boxing championship when he outboxed and outfought Champion Jack Dempsey 10 years ago tonight at Philadelphia. Dempsey finished the 10 rounds groggy and bleeding in a one-sided battle that was decided in a driving rain before a record crowd of 118,738 spectators. Nearly \$2,000,000 was paid to witness one of the greatest upsets in boxing history. They met again Sept. 22, 1927, at Chicago and Tunney retained the crown in the famous "long-count" bout before 102,450 persons and established a record gate of \$2,658,960.

Ruffing Likely To Open Series

When batteries for the opening game of the 1936 world series are announced, Charles Herbert (Red) Ruffing will mount the hill for the New York Yankees, according to present indications. The big righthander, 32 years old, is having his best year with the Ruppert Rifies since 1932, when he bagged 18 and lost 7, won the only series game he pitched against the Chicago Cubs, and led the American League in strikeouts with 190.



Giants Lose Opportunity To Clinch Pennant Losing Doubleheader To Phillies

NEW YORK, Sept. 22—(AP)—The Giants will have to wait at least another day before they clinch the National League pennant.

Needing only two victories to nail the flag to the pole, they had their chance in a doubleheader at Philadelphia today but failed to come through, losing both games to Jimmy Wilson's last place club 11-7 and 6-2.

The Cards victory over the Reds left the Gas House Gang 4 1-2 games off the page and the Giants still in need of two triumphs to win.

Only Carl Hubbell and Fred Fitzsimmons of Bill Terry's mound staff failed to see service as the Giants' pilot used six hurlers, four of them in the nightcap, in an effort to stop the Phils. Hubbell is slated to hurl tomorrow but the League leaders will need to couple a victory with a defeat of the Cards to complete their upward climb.

The Bees staged two late inning rallies at Boston to win a pair of pitching battles from the Brooklyn Dodgers 4-3 and 3-2.

Rupert Thompson's single scored Tony Cucinello in the eighth with the run that gave the Bees the first encounter.

The mound duel between Tiny Chaplin and George Joffe in the second game was broken in the ninth. Hal Lee doubled, moved up on Thompson's sacrifice and scored as Bill Warstler singled.

Lambasting two Pirate pitchers for 15 hits, Cubs beat Pittsburgh 11-4 at Chicago to remain in the National League fight for second place.

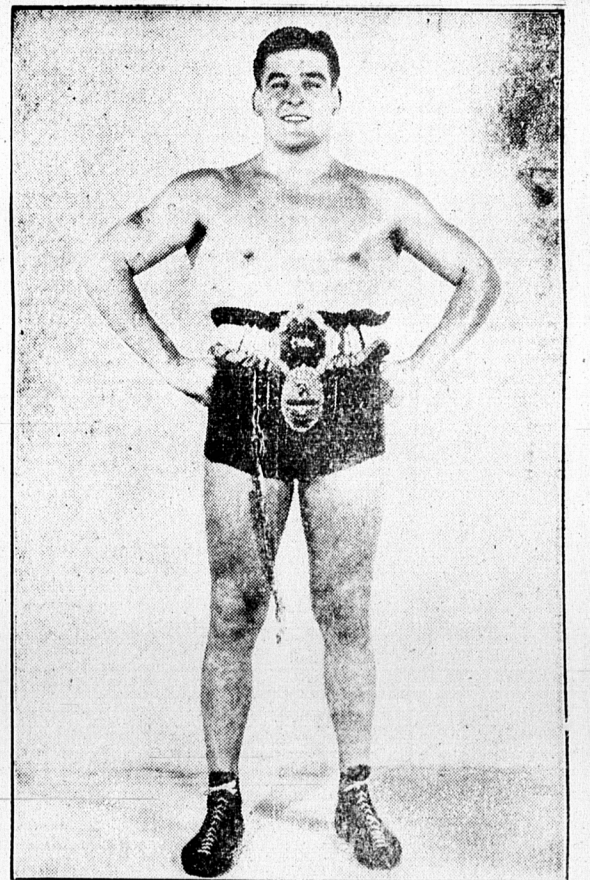

Outstanding among sports attractions in Eastern Canada this year is the world championship heavyweight wrestling bout sponsored by the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition.

The sporting fraternity of the continent will have its attention centered on the Big Fair where on the closing night, October 3, debonair Yvon Robert of Montreal will defend his title claims against Ernie Dusek, bruising United States challenger.

Long awaited as a natural match to settle supremacy and end a bitter feud it remained for Secretary-Manager E. Frank Lordy to come the managers of the giant matmen in Montreal and secure the match for Nova Scotia sportsmen.

Robert became recognized as champion following his defeat of Dann O'Mahoney early in the summer and since then Ernie Dusek has been clamoring for a chance to meet the Canadian with the title at stake. Dusek had twice before entered the ring with O'Mahoney but each time, just when he was becoming confident of victory, he fell victim of Danno's terrible Irish whip.

One of Dusek's skirmishes with the former Irish champion ended in a riot. Excited fans who rushed to the ringside are still debating the merit of the two great grapplers and Dusek has a large following in the United States who believe Ernie should have won. They expect him to prove this by defeating Robert and taking the title back to the United States.

But from the top of the wrestling pile he occupies as a result of his tremendous strength and mat cunning Robert has boomed out he has no intention of relinquishing his crown.

When he leaves Montreal for Halifax a number of Quebec fans will accompany him. Robert is undisturbed by the growing threats of bone crusher Dusek but the Montrealers want to see the gladiators meet in what they believe will be a grapple of the century.

Noted for his punishing tactics Dusek is a rugged workman and in his roughhouse style and willingness to give and take he will find an accommodating match in the Canadian world champion according to Upper Canadian sports writers.

"It was only a fluke I lost to O'Mahoney in my last match but in this title bout there is going to be no mistake" the scowling Dusek served notice when signatures for the bout were affixed.

And the athletic world believes one of the most bitter controversies in the history of the game—between two of the greatest wrestlers who ever climbed into the squared circle—will be decisively settled when Industrial Day at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition draws to a close on the night of October 3, the last day of the week-long Big Fair.
