formally presented his candidacy. The election will be held jointly by the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate at Versailles on Tuesday. Thousands of Parisians flocked to the Presidential Palace today in tribute to the venerable leader. The public will be admitted to the Palace tomorrow. After lying in state until Thursday morning, the body will be taken to Notre Dame Cathedral for funeral services and then conveyed to the pantheon for burial with Doumer's successor, whoever he may be, leading the nation in mourning. The sympathy of the Russian Government for France as a result of the assassination of President Doumer was extended to Premier Andre Tardieu through the Russian Ambassador, Valerian Dorgolevsky.

United States, but exports to the Dominion were less by a greater proportion. Figures issued yesterday show exports to Canada during March were \$24,992,969 as compared with \$41,871,145 in March 1931, while imports from Canada were \$16,946,522, as compared with \$23,151,946 in the same month last year. Total exports of the United States during the month were \$155,254,002 and imports were \$131,341,709, presenting a favorable foreign trade balance of \$23,912,793. Exports of the United States to the United Kingdom were \$23,382,945 compared with \$30,714,725, and imports were \$7,771,687 against \$1,023,228. Exports to Greece, the Irish Free State, India, China and the Philippine Islands showed slight increases, though total exports of the United States were approximately \$19,000,000 less than in March 1931. OTTAWA, May 7—During the 12 months ending March 1, Canada had a favorable balance of trade with the United Kingdom of \$68,411,080, according to a summary of trade published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics today. Trade with the United States showed an unfavorable balance of \$107,199,788. The latter was a decrease of \$11,231,203 from the previous 12 months.

Soviet Deeply Affected
A letter forwarded to M. Tardieu said the Soviet Union had been "deeply affected by the abominable outrage" and conveyed the condolence of the Ambassador personally. "This crime provoked unanimous indignation," the letter said. "I am sure to be the interpreter of my government in assuring you that the tragic death of Paul Doumer is deeply felt by the government and public opinion in my country." Paul Gorgulov, the assassin of President Doumer, is a native of Russia. He said he was a Russian Fascist and a foe of the Communists. The French police, however, have said they had evidence he was a Bolshevik agent. Russian despatches from Moscow today said the newspapers Ivestia and Pravda expressed indignation over a French attempt to stamp Gorgulov as a Soviet agent. The papers criticized France for harboring "white guard bandits." Meanwhile the French police continued their international investigation of Gorgulov's past. They sought information in Germany, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Monaco and were especially interested in any political relations he may have had. From all the comment on the assassination of the President one idea stood out—that France and the world must work to prevent the deed from being repeated and must try to find the remedy.

CENTRAL GUARDIAN TARDIEU GOV'T.

PRESENTATION—A very pleasant function took place on Friday evening last when a deputation from the adult Bible Class of Trinity Church waited upon Rev. Dr. F. J. Coffin in his apartment at the Canadian National Hotel and presented him with a copy of the new Hymnary of the United Church which was procured from Toronto on a special order through Messrs. Carter & Co. The presentation was made by Mr. Benjamin Bremner, the President of the Class who gave suitable expression to the pleasure it had given in listening to the Doctor's learned addresses each Sunday afternoon and the profit derived therefrom. These remarks were further emphasized by Messrs. John F. Whelan and Chas. H. Black, after which Dr. Coffin responded expressing his appreciation of the gift and thanking the Class for remembering him in this way. He was greatly pleased at the assurance given in regard to the course of study which had been carried on and for the interest manifested each Sunday by the sustained attendance of the members and he stated that their meeting together had been a source of much joy to himself.

MURDER

Royal Canadian Mounted Police said the Pitres had been suspected for some time. Six officers went to Beresford, seven miles from here, at 2:30 a. m. yesterday and surrounded the home. The brothers, found asleep, made no resistance. A search of the bed room revealed a quantity of goods identified as having been stolen from a store in the Petit Richer district last fall, when several establishments in that section were broken into. Small change amounting to eleven dollars also was found, as well as twenty two dollars in bills sewn in the men's clothing. Forty dollars were taken from Smith's store on the night he was shot. Three persons who saw the two men on the South Tetagouche Road will be shown the Pitre brothers tomorrow for possible identification.

LONDON, May 8—The Prince of Wales is going to Paris Wednesday to represent the Government at the funeral of President Paul Doumer.
OTTAWA, May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—The Governor General will formally open the magnificent new national research building here on Friday, May 27.
FREDERICTON, N. B., May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—Eleven forest fires, mostly small and either extinguished or under control, were reported over the weekend by the provincial forest service.
FORT WAYNE, Ind., May 8—Robert M. Feustel, president of the Midland United Company and the Public Service Company of Indiana, died at St. Joseph's Hospital here this morning.
OTTAWA, May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett called Premier Ramsay MacDonald expressing his heart-felt sympathy in the indisposition of the British statesman. In a personal message to Mr. MacDonald, Premier Bennett extended his best wishes for a speedy recovery.
TORONTO, May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—Amid scenes of wild excitement, Torchy Feden, Victoria, and Reg Fielding, Toronto, won the six-day bicycle race shortly before midnight last night. The race had been in progress since one minute after midnight last Sunday.
QUEBEC, May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—Returning to Canada after an absence of three months in England, the Countess of Beasborough reached Quebec tonight on the Canadian Pacific liner Montcalm. Her Excellency did not disembark here but will be met by the Governor-General at Montreal upon the liner's arrival there tomorrow morning.
HAVANA, Cuba, May 8 (A.P.)—The national observatory today reported a cyclonic disturbance of considerable intensity approximately midway between the Turks Islands and Bermuda. The disturbance was reported moving almost due northward toward Bermuda.
CAMPBELLTON, N. B., May 8—(By the Canadian Press)—Raphael Melanson, aged 90, father of Monsignor A. Melanson, parish priest of Campbellton, died tonight in the presbytery of the Church of Our Lady of the Snows, Campbellton. Death was caused by his advanced age.
