There was divine service in St. James Church yesterday morning at 11 o'clock.

A large new steam hammer has arrived for the new P. E. I. Railway shops.

The people of Elmira attended in large numbers at the recent concert given by the Glee Club.

Charles Fisher, of Fort Augustus has been appointed wharfinger of Huggerty's wharf, East River.

Farmers in this Province will be interested to know that out of 2,400,000 bushels of seed oats offered by Ontario for the West only a small per cent was accepted. The whole shipment of 102,000 bushels from this Province was accepted.

Among those leaving the City Wednesday was Henry Vickerson of Dunstons, who has gone on a trip to the Pacific Coast. He will be absent about a month, and will take in the principal cities and places between here and Vancouver.

The outward cargo Thursday by the Minto will include two cars oats, three cars way freight, 21 head cattle shipped by Carvell Bros to Newfoundland, four horses shipped by Mr. Kuhn of Dartmouth, N. S., and three shipped by J. P. Woodbury to Truro, N. S.

Rev. C. H. Hamilton's appointments were most acceptably filled in St. John on Sunday by Rev. Joseph Pascoe, of Petitoiac, both well known in this Province. Rev. Mr. Hamilton is still in Montreal. It is understood that Mrs. Hamilton's condition has slightly improved during the last few days.

The large increase in the number of pupils at the Union Commercial College necessitated their ordering the new Tri-Chrome Smith Premier Typewriters from A. Milne Fraser. Mr. Fraser left for home Thursday morning and reports an increased demand for this famous machine on P. E. Island.

The Bank of Nova Scotia has just awarded the contract for a \$250,000 fire proof building at Winnipeg. The building will be one of the finest in that City and the site, a corner, cost \$2,840 per foot, the highest figure ever reached in Winnipeg realty. The building which stands on the site at present was one of the original Fort Garry warehouses, built of hewn oak logs.

A large number of visitors took the opportunity offered Wednesday afternoon to visit the Domestic Science Department of the P.W.C., which is under the able direction of Miss Juniper. Many and dainty were the dishes displayed and included all kinds of plain and fancy small cakes also large cakes beautifully iced and decorated, jellies of all kinds, tastefully garnished meats, fruit and meat salads, pastry in several varieties; in fact every thing imaginable required for a dainty luncheon. In speaking with Miss Juniper it was learned that the entire display was the work of the students of the P.W.C. and the senior members of the City Schools and was simply the ending of their term's work. The Domestic Science rooms, which by the way were designed by Miss Juniper, are replete with every requirement for cooking. Each young lady is furnished with a locker in which is kept all the dishes, pans, rolling pins, pastry boards, etc., needed, also the different dish towels, soap etc., required by an expert housekeeper. Each young lady leaves her locker, as she finds it, in perfect order, when her lesson is finished. Large cupboards enamelled in white are used to keep the different ingredients in and each in its glass bottle is plainly labelled and put in systematic order on the different shelves. The two large ranges and gas stove, by which the cooking is done, are a delight to the eye, while the cupboard with its full set of dishes is most complete. In the dining room was displayed a table perfect in appointment, and many who viewed it received a lesson which should last. Taken altogether the work was splendidly done and the training which the pupils receive cannot be too highly spoken of and should be encouraged in every way, so that the young may learn to be model housekeepers and cooks as well as clever in other branches of education.
