**GOV'T Protect Radio Fans**

**OTTAWA, March 23.**—A bill for the extension of a patent on the Fleming valve used in tube radio sets and held until last year by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of Canada, failed to pass second reading in the House of Commons last night. During the debate on the bill it would cost the radio-using public of Canada \$75,000,000 in the next six years.

The bill was introduced by Herbert Marler, M. P., and was strongly opposed by J. A. Wallace, M. P., who stated that since the patent had expired in 1924 the price of the tube had dropped from \$6 to \$1. He contended that in all likelihood the price would advance if the bill was passed. J. L. Brown supported Mr. Wallace.
