Miss Winnie Wadman, Crapaud, spent Sunday in Charlottetown.

The many friends of John Percival, Charlottetown, who have been undergoing treatment in the Charlottetown Hospital, will be glad to know that he is improving.

Arthur Fraser, Charlottetown, of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. is now stationed at Cape Bear, messages being transmitted and received by the company by telegraph instead of the phone.

Rev. E. H. Creed, and wife, of Harcourt, N. B., and Rev. G. Earle and wife, of Jerusalem, N.B., are planning to visit England during the coming summer.—(Both pastors are known in this province.)

The Charlottetown Condensed Milk Company, Limited, has the Guardian's thanks for a number of handsome blotters. The face of each one is beautified with pretty colored pictures chiefly of country scenes, showing herds of cattle, etc. The total of blotters number eighteen and the face of each blotter contains a different illustration.

Major A. G. Peake and Capt. C. L. McKay of the Fourth Regiment, Charlottetown, have returned from Ottawa, where they interviewed the Minister of Militia re the proposal to have all the artillery drill in Petawawa for 16 days. They represented to the Minister that it would be impossible for many of the men, such as clerks in the banks &c., to leave home at that time. As a result of their representations it is likely that the training will be held as usual this year in Charlottetown. It is likely also that the proposal to reduce the staff, will not be carried out.

The residence of Peter McN. and Mrs. Robertson, of Marsfield, was the scene of a pleasant function Friday night, when a farewell social was tendered their son Bannerman Robertson, who leaves today for Winnipeg, where he will locate. About one hundred persons were present from Marsfield, Suffolk, French Fort, Charlottetown and other sections. Wallace Owen of French Fort, on behalf of the company, presented Mr. Robertson with a handsome dress suit case. The recipient acknowledged the presentation in suitable terms, and Mr. Robertson, Sr., also expressed his appreciation of the tribute regard to his son. The hours were enjoyably spent in dancing, games, etc., and a dainty supper was served during the evening.

A Richibucto paper of recent date has the following:—The ferry proposal, between the mainland and Prince Edward Island, has awakened a great deal of interest here. Advocates of the Richibucto Cape—West Point route are exceedingly active, and soundings and surveys are being carried on under the direction of E. G. Evans, a well known railway man, who has made recommendations to the Dominion Government in the connection. Evans was an advocate of a car ferry service in place of a tunnel, and with the adoption of the idea, he is now securing data in favor of the route here mentioned as against the Cape Tormentine-Cape Traverse crossing. It is contended that the choice lies between the two Dr. J. T. Bourque, M. P. P., says:—"My own observations of winter conditions for many years at Richibucto Cape are confirmed by expert investigation—that there is little or no ice obstruction during any part of the winter. Judging from information obtained from fishermen and old inhabitants about Richibucto, it is feasible to navigate during the winter with regularity between the shore ice and frailty on either side, and there appears to be no reason why a ferry steamer properly designed cannot operate satisfactorily between these points. Navigation would be through drift ice, which is more or less broken up by continual movement through this part of the Strait. "The distance of 151 miles from Moncton to Charlottetown can be covered in nine hours, including transfer to and from ferry, compared with the distance via Picton and Georgetown of 226 miles, which takes 15 hours under favorable conditions, saving 72 miles in distance and six hours in time—two very important considerations in transportation."

S. M. Hicks and Mrs. Hicks, Summerside, came to Charlottetown Saturday.

J. Willard Smith and Rev. H. E. Thomas, of St. John, were elected vice-presidents of the Dominion Temperance Alliance at its recent session held in Toronto. Rev. Mr. Thomas was formerly of Charlottetown.

The S. S. Rosalind, Capt. W. Williams, well known in Charlottetown, left New York on Tuesday evening for St. John's, Nfld., with a large amount of freight. It is likely that owing to the enormous amount of freight offering at the three ports that another steamer will be placed on the route, the agents at St. John's were forced to refuse much cargo, principally fish, owing to lack of carrying capacity.

George Douglas of the mechanical Department of the P. E. I. R., Charlottetown while engaged Friday in cutting a piece of boiler plate met with a painful accident, sustaining a deep cut across the wrist from the jagged edge of the plate, which severed two arteries. Herbert Van Idersing with great presence of mind lashed up the arm with a tight band which considerably injured the flow of blood and the injured man was taken to Dr. Ralph's office, where the wound was dressed. Mr. Douglas will on account of this accident be unable to resume work for several weeks.

Joseph Whitaway of the Orioles hockey team, charged with assaulting Russell Ward, of the Pirates' septette was acquitted by Stipendiary Fielding twelve witnesses were examined, and the case was most interesting, attracting about sixty or so citizens, most of them hockey players. There was no evidence to show that defendant had struck the plaintiff intentionally, while there was an abundance to prove that Ward had been struck on the head with Whitaway's stick after he had fallen. It was shown by some of the witnesses that the game was very rough, and that most of the Pirates-Orioles contest had been more or less so. One witness testified that he had been given a similar ab by an Oriole contestant on the same night that Ward was alleged to have assaulted, March 14th. The first witness was E. Cooper, of the Orioles' hockey team. He saw Ward come around from behind the goal with the puck, defendant chasing him. The two players collided, Ward falling. After getting up he showed over to Whitaway and said: "I'll get you yet." Thomas Boudreau, Charles Vaughan, John Hanton and James Hillman of the Orioles were also examined for the defence, their evidence suggesting an accident.—Halifax ex. (Whitaway and the others of the Orioles team referred to above, played hockey in Charlottetown some weeks ago.)
