He is now in England as an aviation instructor having returned from France the 12th of December. The decoration was bestowed in recognition of his having brought down Boche planes. Lieut. Gus Thompson had two brothers in service. Sergt. Geo. of the 150th Battalion and Sergt. Henry O. Thompson who was killed in action on the 31st March 1918 at Arras France.

ACCIDENT AVERTED.—A most gallant rescue in which remarkable presence of mind was shown was effected in this city last week by Mrs. A. W. Hyndman. Mrs. Hyndman was driving up Euston Street in Shelton's team when she saw coming round W. K. Rogers' corner a runaway horse dragging behind him an overturned sleigh. The runaway was taking up the whole sidewalk and right in his path were the two young children of Mr. James A. McMillan aged 3-1-2 and the other 7 on their way to visit their grandmother Mrs. George E. Hughes. Mrs. Hyndman, realizing the situation and without waiting even to speak to her driver leaped from the moving sleigh and rushed towards the children. She caught the younger one and lifted him out of harm's way on to Mrs. Hooper's doorstep while the older boy also scrambled up the steps. The rescue was just in the nick of time as the sleigh of the runaway struck the lower step as the horse madly dashed by. The children were in imminent peril, and but for Mrs. Hyndman, a most deplorable accident would have occurred. Hearty congratulations to this lady are in order.

FIRST DISTRICT SECRETARY.—A recent issue of "Canadian Manhood," published in Toronto by the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. of Canada, says: R. C. Sidenius has arrived at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, as the first district secretary in the Maritime Provinces. It might be added that he is the first District Association man in all Canada. Mr. Sidenius comes from a busy work in Ontario, where he was engaged in promotion of the Canadian Standard Efficiency Training Programme and Soldiers of the Soil in a section of ten counties. He was very successful in his former field. The three counties of the Island Province have needed supervision along Association lines such as Mr. Sidenius is well qualified to give. The placing of a supervisor in Prince Edward Island is an event of unusual importance since it is the fulfilment of the new district plan for Canada, which aims at organization and supervision of the entire Dominion. This means that county work and other types of Association work will be promoted on a scale hitherto unheard of.

Great War Veterans Hold Meeting

An interesting and well attended meeting of the G. W. V. A. was held Friday night in their club rooms, on Queen Street.

Thirty-three new members were admitted into the Association, after having first passed through the hands of the investigating committee.

Among other important matters brought up was the appointment of a Street Inquiry Committee consisting of five members, whose duties are to investigate any street row or disturbance of any kind which might be put down to returned men, and use their own sound judgment on what course of action to take. It is not the intention of this committee to interfere in any way with the lawful rights of either the civil or military police to take charge of a soldier causing a disturbance, but rather to see, as far as possible, that justice is done on both sides, by going so far as assisting in apprehending the disturber, if such extreme action is found necessary.

It was also decided that the Inquiry Committee assisted by all of the members of the Association would do all in their power to put down the illegal sale of rotten so-called liquor which is being sold to soldiers at exorbitant prices and to assist in apprehending the ones who sell the same.
