Regained Voice Through Rage.

DETROIT, Oct. 4.—Annie Koertner had two gentlemen callers last night, and desiring to take a tandem ride with her best young man, asked her friend, Victoria Michowski, a deaf-mute, to entertain the other young man. Both couples started away on tandems, and Annie and her young man were soon out of sight.

Victoria's young man, who is known to her only by the name of Pete, attempted to make love to his dumb girl on the tandem, and when she did not say no he attempted to hug and kiss her.

Then Victoria found her voice and yelled so loudly that the neighborhood was stirred up and men got after the madam with revolvers. Only one shot was fired, when Pete deserted the bicycle and took to his heels, leaving Victoria yelling and the bicycle tangled up on the ground.

Victoria shouted in rage all the way to the police station, where she told the police her troubles in broken speech. She has been able to make herself understood to a small extent today.

Her parents think her speech will be restored, but have asked the police to arrest Pete.

St. Paul on High Bonnets.

BELLEVILLE, Ill., October 4.—Rev. William Weber, pastor of St. Paul's Free Protestant church, preached a wonderful sermon on Sunday night, and one that the town is just beginning to talk about. He gives St. Paul as the responsible person for the hat in the theatre and elsewhere. Mr. Weber bases his belief on the first part of Chapter 11 of the First Epistle to the Corinthians. In the passage, the Apostle Paul commands men of the congregation to have their heads uncovered, and the women to have their covered when praying or prophesying, which, the pastor says, means when attending religious services. Paul, according to the minister, followed this command wherever he formed congregations, the pastor leads up to the theatre by saying that the theatre of the ancient Greeks was a religious institution, and he traces up the evolution until he connects it with the modern theatre, church and other places where women congregate and wear their hats.

Boy saves twenty lives.

WILKE-BARRE, Pa., Oct. 2.—The fire in the Midvale colliery of the Le-high Valley Coal Company was extinguished this morning and the bodies of the last two victims were found. The man had evidently become confused in trying to escape and had run in the wrong direction, going farther into the mine instead of toward the foot of the slope. They were lying side by side, with hands clasped.

The cause of the fire will probably never be known. The only theory of the officials is that it came from a driver boy's lamp brushing against an oil-soaked timber.

John Hance, one of the driver boys, saved twenty lives at the risk of his own. When he first smelled the smoke he was in the main gangway. He knew that his danger was great, as the fire was between him and the foot of the slope. He also knew that twenty men were working in a remote spot, where the smoke would not reach him until the other workings were filled with it, and that then escape would be impossible. He rushed in to warn them, and managed to reach them. The men dropped drills, shovels and picks and rushed pell-mell toward the slope to safety. But not so young Hance. Seeing two mules, attached to a trip of cars, described by the driver, he unhooked them. He drove them along until they neared the fire, when they refused to budge farther. The boy did not give up, however until he fell fainting against the car. In a few minutes it would have been all up with him, but a miner stumbling past heard the boy moan and picking him up, carried him out.

Constantinople, Oct. 4.—Fifty Armenians have been killed, advices from Vaa say, in fighting at Alshgorb between Turks and some Armenians from Russia.
