CANADIAN APPLES IN DEMAND.

Great Britain and Germany Will Require Three-Quarters of all the Crop of Canada and the United States.
OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—The Canadian apple will be sought after this year. Mr. G. W. Hunt, of the Ottawa Fruit and Produce Exchange, giving the following statement regarding the reports from eighteen districts, from which a large part of the world's supply of apples comes.
"As reported before the crop of early apples is fairly good in the southern part of Great Britain, while there is none in the north. Belgium has a small crop and Germany practically none at all. The Hudson River Valley has an exceptionally heavy crop of early apples. Texas has also got a fairly good crop. Missouri has an average crop. Out of eighteen reports received from Ontario it goes to show that the early apples, with one or two exceptions, are above an average crop.
"It is estimated the yield of apples this year will equal the crop of '98, but with much better facilities for handling the crop there is no possibility of its being so disastrous to the growers, as the canners are buying all the apples at a price equal to \$2 delivered here, and as quickly as the prices here decline below \$2 the canners will take all the apples the growers have got. It is estimated Great Britain and Germany this year will require three-quarters of all the apples that are grown in the United States and Canada.

BISHOP MOORE GOING TO CHINA.

Will Sail on Aug. 29 to Reorganize the Methodist Church Work in the Orient.
Bishop David H. Moore of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who is on his way to Shanghai, China, to take charge of missionary interests in China, Korea, and Japan, is making a short visit with his son, Professor Eliakim H. Moore, head of the department of mathematics in the University of Chicago. He will sail from San Francisco on Aug. 29. His wife and daughter Marian, who accompany him, will stop at Nagasaki, Japan, until the troubles in China are settled.
"My first and most urgent work in China," said Bishop Moore yesterday, "will be to reorganize the work of the missionaries. At present the 156 missionaries of the church are so scattered that they themselves do not know exactly what is going on. A letter received not long ago from Dr. George Lowery stated that they were besieged in Asbury Church, a brick building with an encircling wall of brick, with a garrison of twenty American and English marines and twenty men missionaries. Nearly 300 people have taken refuge in this inclosure, well supplied with food and water, and the soldiers assure them that the place is impregnable except to artillery.
"This war is simply a plowing of the field for the gospel. The conservatism of China must give way to the expansive force of modern ideas."

Convention Call Issued.

The prohibition state committee of Massachusetts has issued the call for the state convention, to be held in Association Hall, Worcester, Thursday September 6, at 10.30 a. m. The call invites the citizens of Massachusetts, without regard to previous party affiliations, who believe that the overthrow of the liquor traffic is the dominant political issue of the hour, and intend to support the Prohibition party nominees, to send delegates to the convention.

Women in Wheat Fields

(From the Chicago Chronicle)
Never before in the history of Kansas has the wheat crop been as abundant as it has been this last year. The harvest is in progress, and all the men women and children in the state who can be drafted into the army of harvesters are busy from daybreak till dark cutting, binding and stacking the golden grain.
Ellis county alone has 147,076 acres of wheat, and in that section of the state there is little of anything except wheat grown. Most of the farmers have their entire acreage in wheat, and to harvest it the wives and children of the farmers go into the fields and work with the men. Eighteen women of Hays City have engaged to go into the harvest fields. They will earn from \$1.40 to \$2 a day, and many a young woman will appear in church this fall with a new frock that was bought with money earned driving a header box.
