YOUNG PEOPLES' RALLY.—On the afternoon of Wednesday February 16th the Presbyterian Young People of Bradbadine and surrounding districts assembled in the Orange Hall Bradbadine for a Young Peoples' Rally. Rev. R. H. Staver, president, and after having conducted a devotional service he introduced Rev. W. M. Kannaquin, D. D., general secretary of Sabbath Schools and Young Peoples' Work for the new Presbyterian Church in Canada. In his address Dr. Kannaquin emphasized the great value in early training in things religious and left a deep impression on the audience. Rev. R. H. Staver spoke briefly along the same line. Some time was then spent in discussing the problems of S. School and Young Peoples' work. Mr. Jas. J. Graham told of the success they had met with in their work since the reorganization of the S. School in the days following the disruption. From the autumn of 1925, until the present they had missed only one session and that was due to the hall being unfit to meet in because of a bad stove-pipe. Quite a large number of the scholars are memorizing the Scripture memory passages and studying in Primary and shorter catechism already several have received their diplomas and certificates. It was decided to organize a Young Peoples' Society. The following officers were elected: President, Marshall Matheson, Vice Pres., Miss Mary Graham, Secretary, Miss Lilian Matheson, Treasurer, Mrs. Robert McLeod. These officers are to meet some evening in the near future and select the members of the several committees. Before the meeting closed a hearty vote of thanks was tendered by the chairman to Dr. Kannaquin for his splendid address and he was suitably acknowledged. The Rally was in every way a success.

Delaney's Claims Aren't Sustained NEW YORK, Mar. 2.—Jack Delaney's claims that his defeat by Jim Maloney was due to hand and arm injuries was contradicted today in a report to the York State Athletic Commission by its official physician, Dr. William H. Walker, who declared his examination of Delaney just after the fight at Madison Square Garden on February 18, disclosed nothing wrong with the boxer.

"Delaney" himself told me he was all right as he used both hands to unlace his shoes," Dr. Walker's report said, "and anything since then (concerning injuries) undoubtedly is untrue."
