City Council

POLICE REPORT

The following report was presented at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council.

Table with 4 columns: Offence, A, C, D, T. Rows include Assault occasioning bodily harm, Drunk in charge of motor vehicle, Drunk and disorderly, etc.

In addition to the above arrests there were seven prosecutions for speeding, resulting in six convictions and one dismissal; two convictions for reckless driving, two under the prohibition act, one for abusive language and one for non payment of dog tax.

On October 21st and 28th the force collected a total of forty two samples of milk and nine of cream from retail storekeepers, delivering same to the City Analyst for Test. In connection with the milk samples collected from licensed milk vendors on September 30th last, four of which contained sediment, the offenders appeared before His Honor the Sibiary Magistrate on October 19th last, being charged under the city by law respecting milk and milk vendors, a conviction was recorded in each case; three were each fined five dollars and costs; a fine of three dollars and costs being imposed in the other case. In the latter case the milk sample contained a very high percentage of butter fat and this fact was taken into consideration by the Court. The amount collected in fines and costs during October is as follows: Prohibition fines, None. Miscellaneous fines and costs, \$331.50. Other duties performed by the Force during October are as follows: Prisoners escorted to Queen's County Jail, 47. Prisoners escorted from jail to Police Court for trial, 23. In both debates the adherents of the two sides brought out the benefits to the Maritimes which would result, the impetus and facility given to the shipment of produce and the employment which would be a great boon to the provinces. The con side equally maintained that the project could not be carried out now because of the depression and the great cost of the project. They also stressed the non-feasibility of the work by the fact that the Fundy tide rises 60 feet every day and also that its
