GOLDEN JUBILEE. St. Peter's Cathedral will commemorate its Golden Jubilee during the month of September. It is expected that a number of the clergy who have been connected with the church and other old friends of the congregation will be present. On Sunday, September 7th, the Right Reverend Edward W. Osborne, retired bishop of Springfield will preach morning and evening. On the 14th the Rev. W. E. The commemoration will include a public reception, a missionary address by Bishop Osborne, and services for the children.

DID NOT DISCREDIT POGROM REPORTS, MORGENTHAU SAYS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. - Henry Morgenthau, member of the American mission sent to Poland to investigate reports of atrocities against Jews, has issued through the State Department a formal denial of statements that he had found reports of all pogroms much exaggerated.

This is the statement issued by the department: "Mr. Morgenthau, having just read a statement issued by the Polish Telegraph Agency on July 28 that he stated in an interview with newspaper correspondents that in the short time he had been in Poland he had convinced himself that all the so-called pogroms of the Jews are incredibly exaggerated, desires to state that he never made such a statement.

"We had not on July 25 commenced investigations of pogroms. We (General Jadwin and myself) had devoted most of our time in Warsaw to obtaining general impressions of people of the existing differences regarding economic boycott and the general economic conditions and worked toward creating a better feeling among the parties. "We left Warsaw on the night of July 27 to investigate at first hand and by direct examination of witnesses and inspection of places where crimes were alleged to have been committed, and the documentary evidence collected by the various commissions at these places so as to enable us to form an opinion on the subject. We shall not be able to give even an intimation as to what our opinion will be until we have completed the visits we intend to make. We have already visited Sokolki, Gradno and Lida, and are now at Vitna, where we expect to spend three or four more days. We shall visit Baronovitch, Brest, Litovsk, Pinsk, Lodz, Cracow, Lemberg and Chentokhovo. "We believe that we have heard less than one-third of the testimony that we intend to listen to before submitting it all to the Polish government for their answer and shall not begin to form an opinion until the Polish government has had an opportunity to answer. Then General Jadwin, Mr. Homer Johnson and myself will calmly sit, as long as it is necessary, and weigh the facts obtained before arriving at final conclusions. As one of the most important questions involved is that of whether any exaggeration has been indulged in by the Jews, Mr. Morgenthau says that this would be the very last question that he should express an opinion upon until the case has been properly heard."
