Alberton S. S. Convention.

The Sunday School Convention held in the Methodist Church, Alberton, Monday, was a large and representative one. The afternoon session opened with devotional exercises by Rev. A. D. McDonald. Minutes read and approved, roll was called and reports from eleven represented Sunday schools were given. Remarks by D. Gordon, Esq., who emphasized the advantage of memorizing Scripture by the schools, especially the younger ones. A paper by Mr. W. S. Clark dwelt upon the Home Department, the prominence temperance work should have and the name of Jesus be spoken of in the home and the Sunday School.

Rev. Mr. Raymond made a strong plea for evergreen schools to be open all the year, and the parents to set a good example to the children by attending the school. He asked for all schools to contribute a mite in order that we could have a permanent Field Secretary.

EVENING SESSION

The evening session opened at 7.30. Devotional exercises were very hearty. The minutes of afternoon session were read and adopted.

An address of welcome was delivered by Rev. Mr. Howard. In the course of his address he urged the importance of closer attention in the Sunday Schools. To save the child from sin saves the man. He welcomed all to the convention and trusted that the addresses during evening would be a benefit to all. A short reply was given by Mr. D. Gordon, "A teacher's relation to his class," a very instructive paper, was read by Mr. Newton Wilkinson.

To be a S.S. Teacher he must have a thorough knowledge of the lesson himself, then he will be better prepared to instruct the scholars.

He also dwelt upon the importance of the attention of the pupils.

An address was given by Rev. M. Mac Donald, on the "Qualification of Teachers," a subject which at the present time receiving more attention than formerly. He strongly urged upon the people the fact that the utmost responsibility rests with the parents and they should make it their supreme object to win their children for Christ. Before the child goes to Sunday School the parents should study the lesson. Then the convention was favored with a solo by Miss Janie Larkin which was highly commented upon, also one by Miss Carrie Pridham which also received favorable comments.

A blackboard lesson by Mr. Anson L. Leard was a very instructive one, bringing before the people many helpful facts in regard to S.S. work. Rev. Mr. Raymond was pleased to see such a large gathering and also the different schools so well represented. He said it was a pleasure to him to be present and to see the talent of the young brought forward.

"What a great benefit we will derive from this convention if all of us practice what is being taught. We do not meet here to have a religiously good time, it is to improve our present method of Sunday School work, and give strong utterance to the need of better home training, also to have in our Sunday School a Normal Class." He also gave several very instructive illustrations on the blackboard which brought the lesson more clearly before the convention.
