DEVIL FISH ATTACKS DIVER

(By Dominion News Service) PARIS, Jan. 4.—A monster octopus (or cuttle, or devil-fish, or kraken) recently attacked Jean Negri, one of the French Admiralty divers, in Toulon port.

Negri is now in the naval hospital, where doctors have given an order that he be given three months' leave of absence on full pay.

During the past five years divers in Toulon have been at work removing the hull of the battleship Liberté, which blew up in Toulon some years ago.

Victor Hugo's description of the titanic battle between Gilliat and the Octopus alone may serve to depict the terrific struggle between Negri and the hideous monster.

One night Negri told his wife he had dreamed of serpents. Indeed, this impressed him so much that, while being helped on with his diving dress he asked his colleagues to give him his spear armed with three prongs besides his dagger.

That precaution served him well. No sooner had he reached the sandy bottom and was directing his steps toward the mass of twisted iron when a mass of moving tentacles rushed in his direction.

Negri instantly recalled his dream. At the same moment one of the tentacles swung over his helmet, a second and third seized him round the waist.

With that promptitude of action which becomes common to divers engaged in the trident with one hand, and with the other pulled hard at the alarm rope.

The signal babbly was instantly responded to. For about a half a minute Negri engaged in a desperate battle with the monster, now minus two tentacles.

He plunged the trident time after time into the living mass. The battle was unequal; Negri lost consciousness. He was hauled out of the water by comrades already armed with harpoons.

He was laid on the deck of the diver's ship. The tentacles were still writhing round his legs. The octopus was dispatched with hatchets by the crew of the diving ship.
