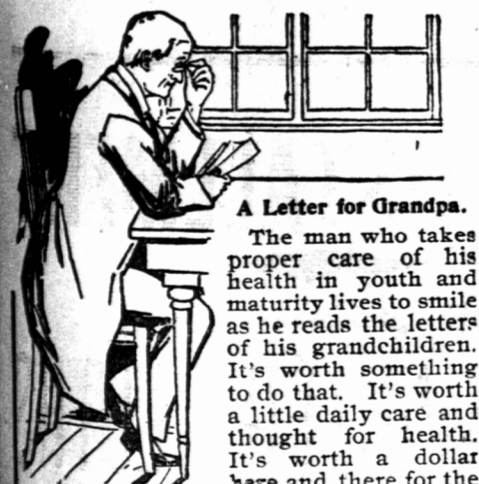
A Racy Description By A Special

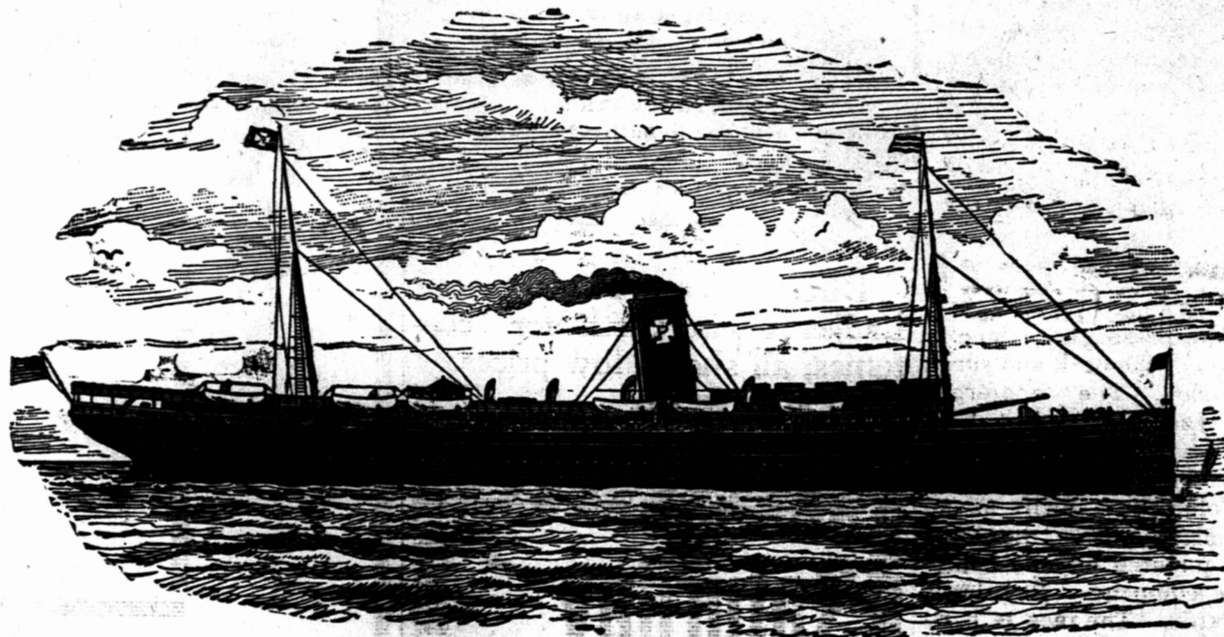

When I commenced this letter I had but one idea—the boat race. I have already mentioned La Grande Duchesse. She will be our home for the next few hours. Any person who has stood on the Charlottetown pier and glanced along her side, cannot conceive her getting away to the races. I have been a sailor, have crossed the Atlantic, but as I lean over the rail and count the hundreds coming aboard all happy pleasure seekers, notice that money is no consideration, it is a struggle for the best.
