**TOXOID CLINICS**—In the campaign for the immunization against diphtheria of all children throughout the Province, there were in the past six days over 1,000 children inoculated in the eastern part of Queens County, of these 112 were of pre school age. That these clinics are being appreciated by the parents is evidenced in the splendid percentage of children coming to the centres, in some schools 100% received their first treatment. Every effort should be made to have as large an attendance of the pre school age children as possible, because these are far more in danger of the serious menace of diphtheria than are their older brothers and sisters. During next week clinics will be held at the following places: Monday—Cornwall, Clyde River and Afton Hall. Tuesday—Bonshaw, Riverview, Argyle Shore, Kelly's Cross and Craupaud. Wednesday—Brookfield, North Wiltshire, Hunter River, Pleasant Valley, Bradalbane and Springfield. Thursday—New Glasgow, Mayfield, Stanley and Irishtown. The teachers in the districts are notified of the hour that the clinic will be held and anyone wishing to have their children receive the Toxoid Treatment should get in touch with their teacher to find out the exact hour as the doctor and Red Cross nurse are only at each centre a certain length of time.

**Horse Notes**

**LEE AXWORTHY, THE WONDER SIRE OF AMERICA**

The two crops of foals sired by the champion trotting stallion, Lee Axworthy, 1.58 1-4, before his untimely death, produced fifty record performers, seventeen of which entered the 2.10 list, a world's record.

Lee Axworthy is by Guy Axworthy 2.08 3-4; he by Axworthy (3) 3.15 1-2 he by Axtell (3) 2.12; world's fastest three-year-old at that time, and who sold for one hundred and five thousand dollars, he by William L., a son of George Wilkes, 2.22, the world's fastest trotting stallion in his time. Lee Axworthy's dam is Gaiety Lee, a daughter of Bingen; second dam Gaiety Girl, by Red Wilkes, a son of George Wilkes.

Lee Axworthy sired Lee Tide, 2.05. Lee Tide's dam is Emily Ellen; a daughter of Todd, a son of Bingen; and she is the dam of seven in 2.10. This makes Lee Tide an inbred Bingen. Todd held the supreme distinction of siring more in the 2.10 list for the time he lived, than any other horse; until the honors were taken away from him by his sister's son, Lee Axworthy.

Lee Tide, sired Spencer, 2.05 1-2 at two years old, the largest money winning two-year-old of 1927, and who reduced to 1.59 3-4 at 3 year-old, and who was the largest money winning three-year-old of 1928, winning the coveted sixty-six thousand two hundred and twenty six Dollar Hambletonian stake at Syracuse, N. Y.; also the fourteen thousand dollar Kentucky Futurity.

Lee Axworthy is by Guy Axworthy, who is the sire of four in two minutes, eighteen in 2.05, ninety-two in 2.10 and commands a fee of two thousand dollars. Peter Volo, Peter the Great's best string son and a stable mate of Guy Axworthy) commands a fee of three hundred dollars. Mr. Reader and Breeder, this will give you an idea of what is thought of Guy Axworthy. When Guy Axworthy was mated with Margaret Parrish, a daughter of Vice Commodore Arion Guy, 1.59 1-2, the world's fastest four-year-old of his time. From Arion Guy's first crop of foals came Adam, 2.07, at two years old, the world's fastest two-year-old in 1926, and who sold for seventeen thousand dollars.

As Lee Tide is an inbred Bingen you will see by reading on what Bingen has accomplished as a sire. Anna Bradford, 2.00 3-4, at three years old (and who held the distinction of being the world's fastest 3 year old for nine years) was sired by Todd Mac, a grandson of Bingen; and when she was mated with The Northern Man another grandson of Bingen she produced Anna Bradford's Girl, 1.59. Bingen sired Uhliah, who is credited with a quarter mile in 27 seconds, a 1.48 clip. He is also credited with a half mile in 56 1-4 seconds—a 1.52 1-2 clip. He is also credited with a full mile in 1.54 1-2. The next fastest mile on record is 1.55 1-4 by Dan Patchen (pacer) and paced with the aid of a winshield; the fastest mile ever paced in the open is 1.58 3-4 by Directum I.

Wherever a family is sought to be established an infusion of Bingen blood should be had so that it might later perpetuate itself through the male line.

There are four things in which the Bingen surpass other families (1) type; (2) gait; (3) breeding on ability; and (4) breeding on through the male line. The Bingen blood appears in the two-minute trotters often than either the Axworthys or Peter the Greats—(American Horse Breeder).

In connection with the above a local horse lover writes:—

As a sire of extreme speed, Lee Axworthy excels all stallions, as no other horse dead or alive achieved such success from their first two crops of foals. Now we have a full brother of Lee Axworthy in Summerside—Bud Axworthy, owned by Mr. James T. Waite, and who was imported here by the late Mr. MacPhie, at a cost of twenty thousand dollars, who has two minute speed. I saw him step the Summerside track and the track was heavy in 2.17, the last quarter in 31 1-4 seconds—a 2.05 clip.

A two year old of Guy Axworthy in 1929 got a mark of 2.07 and sold for \$25,000. Mr. McKelvin, a son of Guy Axworthy had a two-year-old win nine races in 1929 and get a mark of 2.03 3-4, the world's champion two-year-old trotter in a race. Bud Axworthy, the P. E. I. horse has two colts, foaled in 1927, that are showing up well. They are staked for Dominion Day at Summerside.

**The Car Owner's Scrap Book**

**The Firing Order**

The object of using an irregular firing order on the automotive engine is to reduce vibration. It is possible to construct an engine on which the cylinders fire consecutively, but the result would be an unpleasant rocking motion. The car manufacturer determines the firing order which will produce the smoothest operation for his particular engine.

**Leaking Spark Plugs**

If the engine misses on heavy pulls or at high speeds and still operates evenly at low speeds and light pulls, the cause may be leaking spark plugs. If the porcelain is cracked or porous, or if there is a leak around the porcelain, the increased resistance to the spark in the cylinders may cause the current to ground through the engine instead of jumping the gap.

**Automatic Light Switch for the Garage**

When the garage doors are opened at night, the necessity of feeling around for the light switch is often the cause of soiled clothing or bricked shins. An automatic light switch, which turns on the lights when the doors are opened can easily be made by a rearrangement of the present lighting circuit. If the garage is equipped with the pull type switch, it is merely necessary to attach a cord or chain to the door at the proper location. If a snap switch is used, it will be necessary to replace it with the pull type. The cord should be arranged so that the pull is as direct as possible. This arrangement does not turn off the light when the door is closed, which would be undesirable in some cases, as when the light is required for working when the doors are closed.

**Piston Slap**

Piston slap, that annoying and often difficult knock to locate, is caused in most cases by looseness of the piston or by a bent connecting rod. For efficient operation, the piston should be a good fit in the cylinder. Usually, it is about one-thousandth of an inch smaller than the cylinder bore for each inch of piston diameter, measured at the point where the least heat is present, which is at the bottom, or skirt of the piston. At the top, a greater allowance is necessary, as the expansion is greater, due to the direct heat of the explosions.

If the connecting rod is bent, the wrist pin end of the connecting rod is driven sidewise against the piston boss when the force of the explosion is exerted on the piston head.

In either case, the remedy is obvious. In the first case, the cylinders should be ground and oversize pistons installed. In the second case, the connecting rod must be straightened or replaced.

Many Gowns were of White and Fashioned Simply—Lady Passfield Presented Canadian Women

LONDON, May 16—Canadian women who attended the Court at Buckingham Palace Thursday evening were presented to Their Majesties by Lady Passfield, or Mrs. Sidney Webb, as she prefers to be called. As the wife of the secretary for Dominion Affairs, Mrs. Webb presented the Canadians with women from other parts of the Empire.

In former years Canadians were presented by Mrs. P. C. Larkin, wife of the high commissioner, but after the death of Mr. Larkin in February Mrs. Larkin returned to Canada.

**FIRST COURT**

The first Royal Court of the season held Thursday night, was mainly attended by the diplomatic circle. Wives of Ambassadors and other prominent members of the diplomatic corps are entitled to attend every Court, but few avail themselves of the privilege.

All the Courts this year will be smaller than on most occasions, in order to spare His Majesty unnecessary fatigue. Tonight's Court is the first to be graced by the King's presence in two years.

White had been chosen for the great majority of the gowns to be worn by the guests. The lines of the gowns will be simple, the designs being generally accentuated by flounces and rosettes rather than by ornate draperies, as in former years. The long skirt is universally adopted. Another innovation is that most of the girls and women making their Court bows, will wear old-fashioned bouquets instead of the great feather fans which were long in vogue.

**Mgr. J. C. McGuigan Youngest Arch-Bishop In World**

CONSECRATED AT EDMONTON, ALBERTA YESTERDAY AT A NOTABLE GATHERING

EDMONTON, Alta., May 16—Youngest Archbishop in the world, Mgr. J. C. McGuigan, D.D., was consecrated today. With solemn and impressive ceremonies attended by a notable gathering of ecclesiastical and civil dignitaries, he was raised to the dignity of the apostolic succession and made archbishop of Regina, Sask.

In St. Joseph's Cathedral, Mgr. McGuigan received his honor at the age of 35 years through the appointment recently made by the Holy See. Some 1,400 persons thronged the cathedral at the strikingly colorful ceremonial; the edifice was in gala dress for the occasion.

High Catholic prelates and other dignitaries were present from various parts of Canada and took part in the solemn mass which created a new chief pastor of one of the largest and most important dioceses in Canada. The consecrator was His Grace Archbishop O'Leary, of Edmonton.

Mrs. George McGuigan, mother of the new Archbishop, was present and held a place of honor. She had come all the way from Charlottetown, P. E. I., with the other relatives.

Two bishops from the east delivered the sermons for the occasion. The address in English was made by Archbishop McNally, of Hamilton, Ont., while that in French was delivered by Bishop Rheaume, of Halifax, Ont.

**Scandalous Piece of Work Is Verdict**

CHARLES YALE HARRISON'S WAR NOVEL UNDER FIRE IN DOMINION

OTTAWA, Ont., May 16—Indignant protests are being voiced here by prominent military men against Charles Yale Harrison's war book. The book, which has just been published in England, paints an unfavorable picture of Canadian troops in France in 1918, particularly in connection with the entry into Arras, where the author claims Canadian soldiers were guilty of license, drunkenness and looting.

Major General A. G. L. McNaughton, chief of the general staff in the national defense department, said: "I don't know anything about the book, or about the man. I imagine it is one of the so-called post-war books, exhibiting that complex against leadership in any form. Generally speaking these stories are generally grossly exaggerated and without a substratum of truth. Many of these stories we have tracked down and showed that they were without foundation. We don't like to do this kind of work. We would rather ignore the books. The worst feature of them is that they are destructive of leadership in any form."

Lieut.-Col. L. R. Lafleche, Dominion president of the Canadian Legion and former member of the famous 22nd Battalion, C. E. F., said: "From the review the book is a scandalous piece of work. It is apparently another one of those sensational books fringing the truth, if that near to it, and expecting to make a mark by this fact."

**Piston Ring History**

At one time, practically all engines used eccentric piston rings, the prevailing idea being that eccentricity was necessary to produce an even pressure in all directions against the cylinder walls. At the present time the majority of rings are concentric. One claim of the concentric is that it will not turn as easily in the groove, a statement which is borne out by the fact that the eccentric ring was usually locked in position by a pin in the groove, whereas the concentric ring is not. The reason for the eccentric ring turning was due to the fact that it was heavier on one side, and as the roads in general were heavily crowned, the engine was tilted, causing the heavier side of the ring to work to the lower side of the engine.
