Prehistoric Oyster Shells.

That the oyster was in common use by primeval men has been conclusively shown by the discovery in the "kitchen middens" of Denmark of many thousands of oyster shells, showing every evidence of having been artificially opened. In ancient Greece, also, the oyster appears to have been a recognized delicacy, for Dr. Henry Schlegelman, the eminent German archaeologist, in his historic search for the ancient and somewhat mythical city of Troy, found many oyster shells in the ruins of the five prehistoric settlements of Hisarlik. But it was Rome in the height of her power and opulence that, by singling out the oyster as the piece de resistance of the Roman banqueting halls, conferred upon the oyster its just title as one of the most delicious and appetizing foods within the grasp of man.

Cheerfulness and Mirth.

Those are often raised into the greatest transports of mirth who are subject to the greatest depressions of melancholy. Mirth is like a flash of lightning that breaks through a gloom of clouds and glitters for a moment; cheerfulness keeps up a kind of daylight in the mind and fills it with a steady and perpetual serenity."—Joseph Addison.

For Orchardists

As there are still a large number of fruit growers who do not fertilize their orchards, a few words on the subject may not be uninteresting. Like all other plants, fruit trees, of whatever variety, require during their growth and maturity certain elements of fertility commonly called "plant foods." Only four of these, however, need to be considered by the orchardist as an average soil contains a sufficient supply of the others. These are:—

NITROGEN—which acts in a large measure as a stimulant to plant life and promotes the growth of wood and leaf.

PHOSPHORIC ACID—which aids in the formation of blossom and fruit.

POTASH—which, when applied liberally, increases the yielding capacity of the tree, improves the quality of the fruit, and lessens the liability of injury from frost or disease.

LIME—which, in conjunction with Potash, aids in the formation of hard, firm wood, and also in fruit production. POISONED CANDY IN THE SWEET CASE.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 25—Seven days after Dr. B. C. Hyde gave Miss Stella Swope a box of candy, the young woman developed typhoid fever, testified Miss Anna Houlihan, a nurse, yesterday at the trial of Dr. Hyde for the alleged murder of Col. Thos. H. Swope, a member of the Swope tracing family. This is the first time during the evidence has been mentioned in the case as a probable cause of sickness. The mention of the candy surprised Dr. Hyde and his counselors. Dr. Hyde, who was sitting tilted back in his chair, smilingly listened to the testimony of the nurse, quickly moved over to his attorneys and began talking with them. Mrs. Hyde soon joined the little group. For several minutes they talked earnestly.

"It is a significant feature, but I cannot say just what will develop from an investigation of it," said Special Prosecutor James A. Reed later.
