SPECIAL SERVICES HELD—Rev. J. H. Bryan of Boylston, N. S., sends the following news item from the Guysboro Advocate which should be of interest to his relatives on the Island: A week of special revival meetings was held recently in the Manchester United Church under the co-operative leadership of the Pastor, Reverend J. H. Bryan, and Rev. James Hunt of the Baptist Church. In spite of bad weather conditions the meetings were very well attended and a deep interest was taken by all those present. Mrs. Ida MacMaster and Miss Lois Hunt acted as organists at the different meetings.

PYTHIAN SISTERS—Montgomery Temple No. 32, Pythian Sisters was honoured at their last regular meeting, by a visit from Sister Beatrice Hayward, P.C., Deputy Grand Chief, Moncton. Other Grand Officers present were Sister Addie Affleck, P.C., Grand Guard, and Bro. H. E. MacLean, P.C.C. The regular business was carried on, also annual roll call. M.E.C. Helen MacEachern, presiding. Sister Hayward gave an inspiring address on the principles of the order. A feature of the evening was the presentation of gifts to Sisters Hayward and Affleck, by a number of sister: dressed in white formal. A delicious lunch served by the committee in charge, brought an enjoyable evening to a close.

CHARLES STEVENSON died at Charlottetown. The author finds it difficult to say just when or by whom the church in Charlottetown was started, but it was early in the nineteenth century. In 1844, when W. W. Eaton visited the city, there was a small church under the leadership of a Mr. Hughes, but they had no house of worship at that time. Soon after, a building was erected on Great George Street, which was succeeded by the present commodious building on Kent Street, dedicated in 1900. The next new church was organized at Summerside in 1858 by Donald Crawford, in the home of Benjamin Schurman, Lot 16. A building was erected which was burned in the big fire of 1907 and replaced in 1919 by a fine building and parsonage. From this church has gone fourteen preachers and one foreign missionary.

The church at Greenmount, built in 1887, received a substantial endowment through the will of Silas Rayner. At Murray Harbour a church was formed in 1898 by R. W. Stevenson and O. B. Emery.

The Crawford Memorial Church was named after Donald Crawford, whose first meeting at Bradburne was held in 1878. The church at Fredericton, five miles distant, was dedicated in 1901 by M. Waters, worth, when pastor at Montague, was instrumental in having a church building erected in Murray River in 1933.

Many Leaders

The author estimates that almost one hundred preachers, educationists and professional men have come from the Christian Churches of Prince Edward Island. Most of the pioneer preachers were men without college education. A few of the younger men went to Bethany College, but the greater part went to the College of the Bible in Lexington, Ky.

In 1855 the first meeting for a Provincial organization was held in Milton, N. S. On P. E. Island before that time, the churches had what they called an "Association" meeting each year. Dr. Knox was the first Moderator.

Prior to Alexander Crawford's arrival here in 1811, a "little church" of but three or four members was organized by John R. Stewart. Of their number, Bella Campbell and John R. Stewart came from Scotland, where Mr. Stewart had received baptism from the Haldanes. Previous to this small beginning a number had met in homes for worship and teaching. These are named as Donald McGregor, Duncan Kennedy and Donald Stewart. Mr. Crawford's first immersed converts were John Stewart, Duncan Kennedy and Donald McGregor, apparently the original group leaders.

Mr. Crawford preached two years at Lot 48, and afterwards, in the year 1820, returned to it and remained six years. Services were held in a log building, put up in 1813; but in 1838 this was replaced and served until a further building was erected in 1925. Mr. Crawford died at the early age of forty-two, much lamented. He preached also at Three Rivers (Montague), East Point, Bedouque, Tryon, Belfast and other points.

The Stevenson Family

Reference is made by the author to the great impact which the Stevenson family made on the history of the movement in this Province. The original John Stevenson of the Atlantic voyage had six sons, Robert, John, William, Charles, George and Andrew. John was a local preacher at New Glasgow and carried on after his father's death; his grandsons Neilson and Everett had been preachers in Canada and the U. S. A. for years. Rufus W. Stevenson was son of Robert, and had a long career as preacher in the Island, Ontario and in the U. S. A. A bronze tablet honours his memory in the Central Church, Toronto. Charles became leader at Greenmount, near Tignish. For many years Lt. Col. C. L. MacKay, of Charlottetown, a grandson of Charles, has carried a leadership banner. George was an elder at New Glasgow and a son George has followed in his father's steps. William and Andrew lived in Fredericton but were members at New Glasgow, with their families. Elder John Stevenson had five daughters, one of whom, Mrs. George Bagnall, emigrated to New Zealand, and the Bagnall family rank with the pioneers of the church there. Other Stevenson descendants include members of Houston, Dickieson, Wyand, McDonald, Ling and Seaman families.

Details are given of many other families prominent throughout the Province. They include that of the distinguished educationist, Dr.
