ADVERTISE IN PRESS ADVICE TO CHURCHES

PHILADELPHIA, June 23—The churches of America should advertise religion widely in the press, using full-page display, Rev. Chas. Steble of New York, asserted in the Northminster Presbyterian Church today. His address was inspired by the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, now meeting in Philadelphia. "There is a distinct appeal," he added, "when the message is presented with unity—when the churches get together in an advertising campaign and when, for example, they pay for a full-page advertisement in the daily newspaper, not so much to advertise their individual churches as to advertise religion pure and simple."
