THE SUPFRAGETTE SOCIETY LIABLE FOR MILITANTS DAMAGES

LONDON, March 5.—In pursuance of the determination of the government fully to test the efficacy of the existing laws to deal with the latest tactics of the militant suffragettes before resorting to special legislation to make the funding of the suffragette societies liable for damage done by their members, the police to-night raided the offices of the women's social and political union in Clements Inn. They arrested Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Patrick Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women, who was taken to the Bow street police station. The police also had a warrant for the arrest of Miss Christobel Pankhurst, but did not find her there. They took possession of the offices. The leaders of the union are charged with being responsible for the latest window smashing campaign. They will presumably be tried under the conspiracy laws.

SAVAGES WHO BELIEVE IN REINCARNATION.

LONDON, March 4.—Word has been received from Prof. Baldwin Spencer of the Australian Anthropological Survey that he has found in the centre of that continent a number of tribes that believe in reincarnation. It is further announced that the tribes in that respect tally with those of the intellectual native races in India—a belief that has been carried into Western civilization under the name of Theosophy.

Professor Spencer's exploring party backed by the Australian government, went to Fort Darwin, and found there across to Melville Island, then they returned to Port Darwin, and travelled south 200 miles, after which they crossed the continent to the Gulf of Carpentaria. Among all the tribes examined by the expedition they found that the belief in reincarnation is universal.

All of these tribes are totem worshippers. In one or two tribes along the Roper River a curious totemic system was discovered. Among these people a man must marry a woman of a particular totem, but the children are taken a totem different from that of either of the parents. For example, a man of the Rain totem must marry a woman of the paddy-melon kangaroo totem, and their children are of the Euro-Kangaroo totem. Again, a Porcupine man marries a lizard woman, and their children are Bats.

Everything too, among the tribes visited, the women and children believe that the sound of the bull-roarer is the voice of a great spirit who comes to take away the boys when they are initiated.

THE GREATEST EVER FOR THE NAVY OF BRITAIN.

LONDON, March 5.—The British admiralty have ordered a battleship which will break all records for size and horsepower, and which will be built by the firm of John Brown, on the banks of the Clyde. The ship will have a displacement of thirty thousand tons, developing eighty-seven thousand horsepower, and her builders fully expect she will develop one hundred horsepower when she undergoes trials. Her speed must be thirty knots. She will have a battery of unprecedented power, consisting of eight fifteen inch guns, each firing a projectile of two thousand pounds weight, and twelve six-inch weapons.

LONDON, March 5.—There was a demonstration in Bow Street Police Court today when severe sentences were imposed upon women who led the Suffragettes in their window smashing campaign yesterday. Two of the leaders were sentenced to two months at hard labor. When sentence was pronounced property holders in the courtroom gave a loud cheer.

There were about 150 women in jail today as the result of the outbreak yesterday and last night.
