SWITCH AND CATECHISM.

A Richmond Minister on These Agencies Good for Children.

(Richmond Times Dispatch). "The most wicked nation on the face of the earth is the American nation." That was what Rev. Dr. Boggs expressed in his sermon on a recent Sunday as his deliberate opinion. There is no doubt about it that wickedness abounds in this land, that there is corruption in high places and in low places. As many vile things are done nowadays as when the great Apostle wrote his letter to the Romans, that great riches make men forget their religious and political duties, that there is much rottenness among the multi-millionaires; but the preacher made the mistake, as we think, of judging the great American nation by the speckled apples in the barrel.

Rockefeller, the most abused of the over-rich, has certainly not spent any of his money in riotous living. John S. Kennedy disposed of his immense wealth in a way that has met the approval of the best and most progressive people everywhere. Mrs. Sage is doing a great deal of good with what she has. Daniel Hand devoted his millions to good works. George F. Ledyard did not travel around the country with a woman who was not his wife, as the multi-millionaire who was seen by the preacher in a hotel at Jacksonville was doing, and there are thousands of rich women in the United States who never went up to the bar in any hotel and "swigged" their liquor just as if they were men.

Nine pages of the World Almanac for 1910 contain the names of the American multi-millionaires. They have far more money than it is safe for any group of men to have, but over against them there are something like ninety million other Americans who do not belong to their class. It is hardly fair, we think, to condemn the whole American people because of the sayings and doings of a comparatively small class of the people. The danger is not so much in the fact that this minority is possessed of so great a share of the wealth of the country, but in the attempt of the poorer class, the men and women of small means, to imitate the ways of the rich. It is the little fellows, after all, who degrade the race by following the occupation of "professional pleasure seekers."

Dr. Boggs, however, preached a great sermon. It was based on the pitiful and pathetic story of Absalom, and it cut to the quick. It was, in fact, a plea for Christian education, in the family, in the institutions of learning, in the church, and a fearless exposition of the sins and faults of these times, of the neglect of religious instruction in the family, of the neglect of the moral training of the children, of the disposition of the women to despise their motherly duties, of the carelessness with which the men, absorbed in the affairs of their busy life, let their boys and girls go their own gait.

As one of the aids to the right sort of teaching the switch and the Catechism were commended as efficient instruments in the making of better men and women. These were formerly used with good results by old time Presbyterians, and it would be found that they have not yet lost their efficacy. It has been said that the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world, but this hand should be the mother's hand and not the hand of the African nurse, to whom care so many of the children of the present day of "carries in the morning, carries at noon, and carries of the theatre in the evening" is intrusted.

All of the congregation of the Second Presbyterian church, where Dr. Boggs preached, seemed to appreciate and enjoy what he said.

HUSBANDS WHO CUT OFF NOSES OF THEIR WIVES.

After having spent eighteen years among the wild tribes of the northern frontier of India, Dr. Pennell, a medical missionary of the Church Missionary Society, has arrived in London on a visit. He has a wealth of remarkable stories to tell, and some of these he related in an interview with a Daily Chronicle representative.

"On the Afghan frontier a husband is very jealous of his wife's honor," he said, "and if he has a suspicion that anything is wrong he just cuts off her nose. Some time ago a husband who had shown his displeasure in this barbaric manner brought his wife to our hospital at Bannu, and said: 'he was very sorry. There was very little of the nose left, and there was, therefore, nothing that we could do.'

"I told him that if he would pay the money we would get his wife an artificial nose from England. He asked me how much it would cost, and I said \$2. He began to hesitate and I asked him the reason. 'Well,' he said, 'I could get another wife for \$5 for \$4.' Eventually he agreed to buy the nose, and his old wife was patched up."

Dr. Pennell gave another illustration of matrimonial jealousy. "One day," he said, "an Afghan chief who had been across the border came back, and saw his wife speaking to a man in his compound. He at once drew his sword out of his wife's hand, and threw it to the man, saying: 'If you want to speak to her now, you can.'"

Many of the patients at the hospital are the victims of frontier raids. One man who had been admitted there for treatment had been shot by his uncle. The bullet had gone through his lung and when he was brought in there seemed little hope of recovery. However, by dint of careful nursing they pulled him through.

"When he was convalescent," said Dr. Pennell, "he called me one day to his bedside, and explained that he had a petition to make. I asked him what it was. He said: 'Oh, sahib, I want you to give me some cartridges.' I said: 'What do you want the cartridges for?' Pointing to his chest, he replied: 'I have this sore to pay off.' I said: 'I am very sorry to hear that. We have had a difficult task to cure you, and now very shortly we shall have the same trouble with your uncle.' He said: 'Oh, no, you need not be afraid of that, sahib. I am a better shot than he is.' We did not get the uncle in, and we heard eventually that he had killed him."
