FERRY TO OPERATE ALL NIGHT—The P. E. I. Charlottetown Borden-Tormentine service all last night to clear freight accumulated at both terminals, railway officials announced. Ice conditions were causing considerable delay in crossings. Yesterday the powerful ice-breaker left Borden at 2.40 p. m. on the first trip. 10 minutes after leaving Borden it was sitting a blade on one of the after propellers. Four divers under A. P. Corbett labored for 7 o'clock Saturday evening until yesterday afternoon to remove the end of a broken propeller blade and replace it with a new one. Difficultly was experienced in removing bolts fastening the broken part to the hub. The blade was lost last Tuesday. The previous week a forward propeller was lost when the shaft broke. the minimum wage regulations that such an act was already in force.
Applications for the position of truck driver on the new City truck were received from Messrs. Frank Frunkly, Alfred Frizant and Bernie Doherty. Frizant was referred to the street committee for a report at the next meeting. Coun. Hennessey announced that so far as he was concerned he did not think the truck would not be in use all the time.
Reporting as chairman of the unemployment and relief committee, Coun. Henry Laphorn gave the number of families on relief. Following is a summary of his report, with the previous year's figures in brackets: December, 399 families, 1,729 persons, (215, 977); January 516 families, 2,188 persons, (458, 2008); February 524 families, 2,246 persons (618, 2206). Cost of relief for January was \$11,160 and for February \$9,120. Coun. Laphorn told the meeting that 50 families, 250 persons, had been removed from relief lists following a meeting of his committee on March 14th. Since then the families were again placed on relief with some adjustment in the amount of coal they were to receive.
Later in the meeting Coun. Laphorn announced that he had been informed that hard wood in eight-foot lengths was available 35 miles from the City at \$2.75 per cord. He asked Councillors if they thought that next year it might be a chance to buy wood instead of coal for relief purposes.
Coun. Holman, supported by Coun. Blanchard, stated that he believed it was a duty of the City to relieve the burden of direct relief. He hoped that some arrangement could be made by next fall to have the government take over all relief.

FOOD INSPECTOR'S REPORT
Twenty-nine portions of carcasses were condemned as unfit for food and destroyed during the month of February. Dr. B. C. Kneeney, I. E. Croken, meat and milk inspector reported. 32 samples of milk and four samples of cream were collected from licensed vendors and tested for butter fat and sediment. One sample was below the standard for butterfat. Following was the result of the test:

light in the dusk.
The Puchner apparently had not intended to speak until tomorrow at 11 a. m. Then he will address Vienna and the German nation from the Heroes' Square.
This has been an historic day demonstrated before his hotel, calling him back to his balcony again and again. Officers with Hitler said they never had seen such an unbounded release of joy. It surpassed even that of the early Nazi days in Berlin.
Commands Silence
Finally he raised his hands for silence in answer to the clamor for his voice and 100,000 persons in the noisy street became silent.
"The German Reich as it stands today is inviolable," he shouted, "no one can shatter it."
Smiling and obviously deeply moved, he said: "I have felt in the last few days all the emotions which now stir you. You are stirred to the depth of feeling which you now are demonstrating."
"I am deeply stirred by this historic change.
"You all live up to your oath, all of you from Koenigsburg to Hamburg and down to Vienna who do so in deepest emotion!"
Triumphal Entry
Hitler at 4:50 p. m. entered Vienna, once the seat of the Hapsburgs and now a provincial capital in a Germany Hitler has flung

GYRO CLUB REPORTS ON SEAL SALE

Mr. F. J. Gick, Trade Commissioner, Guest Speaker Last Evening.
Mr. F. J. Gick, United Kingdom trade commissioner in Newfoundland and the Maritime Provinces, was the speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Gyro Club held last evening in the Canadian National Hotel.
Mr. Gick in a short but timely and interesting address explained the purposes and duties of the British trade commissioner in Canada and how they co-ordinated their work in an effort to achieve their objectives, chief of which are to assist Canadian firms in finding the source of supply for materials they might wish to import and in making contacts with British firms which they might wish to represent here. He also explained that it was the duty of trade commissioners to endeavour to promote amicable relations between the exporter and the importer and to make personal contacts, if possible, to smooth over friction and misunderstanding between purchaser and seller.
In connection with the Christmas Seal Sale campaign conducted in the City by the Gyro Club, Dr. Keeney reported that the amount raised by personal solicitation was \$805.50 and for receipts from the City mailing list total to date, \$399.32. He reported that the total of \$1,204.82 had been raised to date from the Seal Sale outside of Charlottetown and paid direct to the P. E. Tuberculosis League. In addition, he reported that out of the amount of \$1202.36 raised by the Club in the City, the sum of \$912.43 had been transferred to the League some time ago. The Club this week paid over an additional \$250.00 to the League, and it is proposed to make a further donation in the near future. Dr. Gordon MacDonald, Club President, was Chairman.

Keeney, municipal health officer for Prince Edward Island and health officer for Charlottetown, announced in his report at the monthly meeting of the City Council last night that a house was released from quarantine, the report said. 50 chest examinations were made during the month.

Venereal disease report: patients treated: males, 22; females, 8; total 30. New cases: 1 male, 1 female; total 1; total 4. Total number of treatments given during the month, 162.
Home nursing report: No. of pupils examined in Prince St. school, 26; no. of pupils examined in Rochford Square School, 436; no. home visits 15; no. junior home nursing lessons in Rochford Square School, 9.
Vital statistics report: (City of Charlottetown): births, 16; deaths, 19; marriages, 13.
Reports for the two weeks ending February 28, the period since his appointment as sanitary officer, Mr. M. W. Reardon said:
