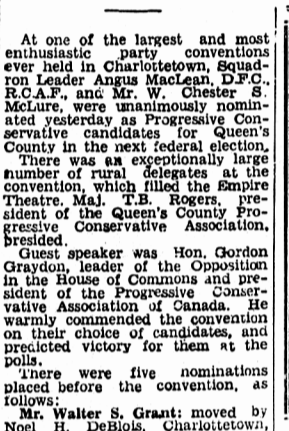
More Beds Required For Battle Casualties
