Borden. It is now up to the hotels and I am glad to say the C.N.R. Hotel in this city has one of the finest reputations of any hotel in Canada and I hope that the other hotels will stand in the same category.

AGRICULTURE

Agriculture—I am going to leave to the Minister of Agriculture. I could say a good deal about it, although I am not a farmer. I have had to learn a good deal about it. They say—well, I will not say what they say at all—I say that the condition of farming in this Province is not satisfactory and that a great deal can be done to make it satisfactory and we are proposing to do that by bringing the services of the Department of Agriculture directly to farmers who have not had an opportunity, because after all in the past the Department has been serving those farmers who were in a better position to look after themselves than others. The most prosperous farmers were those who have taken advantage of the services of the Department and under all Governments, but you have to reach out to those who need it, the poorer farmers and that is what we are endeavouring to do this year.

MARKETING BOARD

Just one word about the Marketing Board. Let those who criticize it remember this, it is not a creature of this Government. It is an instrument of the farmers and producers themselves. It is an attempt to put into operation some co-operative method of marketing their potatoes, and has nothing to do with this Government. We made appointments and endeavoured to do what we could to help but any man who criticizes the Marketing Board is criticizing the well intentioned and co-operative efforts of the farmers of this Province.

We have continued to support exhibitions and fox shows and will do so in future, we believe it is one of the best things in the interests of the farmers.

We have revived the Transportation Commission and we hope that freight rates, which are a very great disability on the people of this country will be reduced somewhat.

MARITIME CLAIMS

There is just one other matter I wish to refer to and that is the matter of Maritime Claims. My friend, the editor of the Patriot, took me to task on this. I just wish to refer to it, because I generally try to keep my expressions accurate. I can't refer to it, Mr. Speaker, because it is in the Draft Address, but I am going to say this, that for thirty years we have heard about Maritime Claims. So far as Maritime Claims are concerned the contrast between the two parties is very striking, because the record of the Conservative party is one of realization and the record of the Liberal party is a record of goose eggs. In 1901 this Province received \$30,000 a year on the grounds of the non-fulfilment of transportation between this Province and the Mainland. Now remember, Mr. Speaker, in 1901 there was an increase in subsidy to this Province of \$70,000. It was not on Maritime claims or any other claim, it was an adjustment of the general subsidies of the Provinces of Canada and should not be given to the credit of any Government. Every Province in Canada shared in a redistribution of subsidies but in 1912 we had the first straight recognition of Maritime Claims, so called, and Prince Edward Island's claims in particular, made by that man who knew how to prepare claims and knew how to present them—the present Chief Justice of this Province. And the next move that was worth while, and it was a distinct Maritime claim, Mr. Speaker, was when \$40,000 of railway taxes came into this Province and came to all Maritime Provinces through the conjoint efforts of the Maritime Premiers. That meeting was inaugurated by this Province—the Honourable J. D. Stewart. The next step was the interim award of the Dunoon Commission of \$125,000 a year and that was the work of Conservative Governments presented before the Dunoon Commission. That was what was realized and then comes a great big blank, for which my Honourable Friends on the other side of the House are responsible. Those were the good years! Wonderful years, to hear them get up and tell about the millions of dollars of trade between this country and the countries of the world and about favourable balance of trade and about how everything was rich and prosperous! Wonderful, why the so called "Golden Era" under Sir Wilfred Laurier, when this country was flowing with milk and honey, was nothing compared to those years in which my friends on the other side of the House did nothing, got nothing.

CLOSING REMARKS

In closing I just wish to say that this is possibly the last statement that I will be making at this session of the House, and I extend year when I feel that I will be back again, endeavouring to deliver another budget speech, because whatever hope the people of this country have in those who are administering the government, I think the conclusion must be borne in on them long ago that their only hope is in a Conservative government. It is a Conservative Government which originated those grants and aids to roads, technical education and to agriculture. The Conservative Government is the only Government that ever did anything for this Province so far as the realization of Maritime Claims is concerned. We built the ferry, widened the gars, reduced the car ferry rates. I think the people of this country know who are the best to administer the Government of this Province and I feel that when the elections come around in a few months they will know the record of this Government, they will know what they may expect, that we will go on as we did in the past few years of depression. We have carried our people through, we have helped them in every possible way. There has been very little disability in this Province and the record of this Government stands high as far as Governments of Canada are concerned and I have no doubt when it comes to a general election the people will say "Here, carry on for another while because we have no faith in the Opposition." (Loud and prolonged applause.)
