**TAFT AND KNOX AT REID FUNERAL**

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Scores of men prominent in public life, including President Taft and members of the diplomatic corps in Washington, attended the funeral of Whitelaw Reid, late American Ambassador to the court of St. James.

Although the weather was cold and foggy crowds began to gather about the Cathedral of St. John the Divine long before 11 o'clock, when the services began.

President Taft, with Postmaster-General Hitchcock and Secretary of State Knox, the latter one of the pallbearers, arrived early in the morning from Washington and went to the residence of Henry W. Taft before going to the cathedral.

The casket, covered with flags and flowers, which had lain in the crypt all night with a solitary marine standing guard over it, occupied a dais before the altar.

Special trains were chartered to carry the mourners to Tarrytown for the interment in Sleepy Hollow cemetery.
